AL SMITH IS DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE FOR PRESIDENT

the convention floor, and even after the platform was approved and the nomination was made to the tune of a long and loud demonstration, the convention stood on until well after midnight hearing exhortations to battle. Besides Senator Reed, John W. Davis, the party nominee four years ago, was brought to the convention platform. He told the cheering delegates that the call of his party in 1928 was harmony under the leadership of Smith.

Four States Dissent
In the final tabulation of the vote by which the New York vote was chosen, only five states appear as having failed to give the leader at least a part of their support, and one of them was Reed's own state of Missouri, which was blocked by convention rules when it sought to turn the band wagon movement to Smith into a nomination by acclamation. The others were Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Texas—representing the remnants of what the anti-Smith leaders had once hoped to build into an irresistible bone dry and anti-Tammany phalanx against the nomination of the governor.

Scattering Minority
The final totals of the official ballot, revised to show switches to Smith after the nomination became inevitable, tells impressively the margin of his victory:

Ohio Clinches Victory
It really was Ohio that consummated the nomination. When the first call of the roll had been completed, Smith's total stood at 724 2-3, or nine short of the number needed to nominate, but having paid their tribute to their respective favorite sons, a half dozen states were ready to change their votes and get aboard the band wagon. For several minutes a presidential nomination hung in the air, while delegation chairmen from all sections of the hall tried to shout each other down in their rival attempts to be first to switch to Smith. Chairman Meeker of Ohio, standing on his chair in the right center of the delegate section, won out and cast for New York governor 41 Ohio votes where he had had but one on the initial roll call.

Mississippi, Indiana, Nebraska, Kansas and Tennessee quickly followed giving Smith votes he no longer needed, and reducing the anti-Smith resistance to but 250 of the convention's total strength of 1100 delegates.

Cheers Greet Message
SAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 29.—Governor Smith's telegram replying to the notification of his nomination was read from all sections of the hall today at the democratic national convention today as the last act before final adjournment.

There was a very short burst of cheering when the chairman came to the words in which the governor declared he would be bound by the party platform and if elected would obey his oath to the best of his ability.

Closing followed the reading of that part of the message in which the party nominees reiterated his belief that the prohibition law should be modified.

When the message had been finished the assemblage stood for a moment cheering.

Strains of "Old Gray Mare," Heard at Houston, Inspired by Civil War Event; Played Also in World War

HOUSTON, June 29.—Stories of Civil War days, when the melody, "The Old Gray Mare," was originated, come to the minds of delegates and visitors in Houston for the democratic convention as they watch and listen to the "Old Gray Mare band" of Brownwood, Texas. The band of 50 pieces, led by Miss Katie Myrl Parks riding Sarah II, the old gray mare which "ain't what she used to be," is here for the convention. As the cowboys parade in their chaps and high-heeled boots and hold their brass instruments under spacious sombreros, there are reminiscences of the episode which inspired the song.

Noted March Recalled
The story is that Hood's Texas brigade was making a forced march to relieve Confederate troops then in action during the second battle of Manassas. For two days and nights the Texans marched, with no food for their mounts and very little for themselves.

Late in the second night they bivouacked near the lines. Naturally they were under a high tension with the knowledge that they would face fire by morning.

Just before dawn, the brigade was awakened by a rattle and bang near the camp kitchen. Thinking the enemy had surrounded them as they slept, the Texans hastily sought shelter behind trees and brush.

Suddenly a young member of the brigade, whose name is lost

to posterity, sang out: "It's the old gray mare come a tearin' through the wilderness."

The mare—it was Sarah I—staked nearby, had worked herself free of the ropes. Browsing about for grass she stumbled over the kitchen, scattering pots and pans.

After the war, Chief Musician Bailey, who served as master musician in one of the regiments of Hood's brigade, wrote the music now known as "The Old Gray Mare."

Heard in World War
In the World war, the 36th division band carried the tune overseas, where it soon was adopted by foreign bands and played on many occasions.

When the World war ended, the 36th division was reorganized as part of the Texas national guard. Wright Armstrong was ordered to organize a band in the First Texas infantry, and after he had gotten his musicians together he found that the only melody all knew was "The Old Gray Mare."

Consequently, every place the band went it played "The Old Gray Mare," and that song has carried it to several national conventions of the American Legion.

In all parades, the band follows a feminine sponsor mounted on a successor to the old gray mare which so frightened Hood's brigade.

Miss Parks, the present sponsor, knows Sarah II "ain't what she used to be," but makes her mount walk with dignity and grace at the head of the band.

destroyed the usefulness of the present commission."

Foreign policy: Outlawry of war; freedom from entangling political alliances with other nations; protection of American lives and rights; reduction of armament and non-interference with the elections of other internal political affairs of any foreign nation, including "Mexico, Nicaragua and all other Latin-American nations."

Water power, waterways: Deep waterways from the Great Lakes to the Gulf and the Atlantic ocean and the expeditious construction of flood relief works on the Mississippi and Colorado rivers.

Labor and Veterans: Collective bargaining, exemption of labor from operation of the anti-trust laws and correction of the abuses in the instance of injunctions in labor disputes.

Veterans: Generous appropriations, honest management, removal of vexatious and administration delays, and sympathetic assistance for the veterans of all wars.

Unemployment: Correction of this misfortune by adoption of a

scientific plan for construction of necessary public works during periods of labor depression.

Women and children: Equality of women with men in all political and governmental affairs and protection of children through their infancy and childhood.

Immigration: Preservation of the quota law, but with elimination of provisions that separate husbands from wives and patents from infant children.

Radio: Government control must prevent monopolistic use of radio communications and guarantee equitable distribution and enjoyment thereof.

Coal: Constructive legislation that will allow capital and labor a fair share of prosperity with adequate protection to the consuming public.

Would Change Session
Congressional elections reform: Abolishing "lame duck" sessions of congress by advancing the date for the new congresses to meet to two months after the general election.

Campaign expenditures: Improper and excessive use of money in elections is condemned and a pledge made for publicity of democratic campaign receipts and expenditures in the coming election every thirty days beginning with August 1.

Merchant marine: Continued government operation, but with the gradual sale of ships and lines to private owners.

Education: Federal offer to the states of such counsel, advice, result of research and aid as may be available through the federal agencies for the general improvement of schools.

Monopolies and anti-trust laws: Strict enforcement of the anti-trust laws and the enactment of others to control monopolies and protect the small merchant and manufacturer.

Flood control: Endorsement of the Jones-White bill for Mississippi river and Sacramento river flood control.

State Rights Upheld
Rights of states: Constitutional rights and powers of the states shall be preserved and bureau-

cracy and the multiplication of offices and office holders sharply checked.

Economy and reorganization: Business-like reorganization of all government departments; elimination of all duplication, waste and overlapping and substitution of modern business methods.

Transportation: Encouragement of the department of air transportation; continued federal aid for good roads and the protection of common carriers, whether by land, water or rail, in an equal opportunity to compete.

Autonomy Favored
Insular possessions: Development of self-government for Alaska and Hawaii with appointment of only bonafide residents to office in the territories.

Philippines: Immediate independence.

Porto Rico: Territorial government or government as would best meet the island's need with a view to ultimate statehood.

Other planks declare for fostering the mining industry; a living wage for federal employees; more liberal compensation to federal employees who are injured or killed; employment of American citizens in co-operation and maintenance of the Panama Canal in all positions above messenger with liberal compensation; fulfillment of the promises made to Arizonians for local self-government by the allies and America after the World War and preservation of the civil service.
