SERIOUS MISHAP SAVES TITLE FOR STRANGLER LEWIS

Sonnenberg, With Victory
in Sight, Dives Thru
Ropes; Insensible
in Hospital.

(Associated Press Local Wire)

BOSTON, June 30.—Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth football star, who was injured in a heavyweight wrestling match with Ed "Strangler" Lewis here last night, may have suffered a broken neck, an x-ray examination revealed today.

Sonnenberg, who was taken to a private hospital unconscious, was reported as considerably improved today and doctors expressed the opinion that he would recover.

BOSTON, June 30.—Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth football star and victor in 40 consecutive heavyweight wrestling matches, was unconscious in a hospital today with concussion of the

brain as the aftermath of a sensational bout last night with Ed "Strangler" Lewis, in which the stranger came within a fraction of forfeiting his title.

Sonnenberg won the first fall. Then the former collegian attempted to negotiate a second flying tackle hold on the champion. Lewis sidestepped and Sonnenberg literally flew through the ropes to land on his head beyond the row of newspapermen.

Nearly 10,000 persons saw the spectacular climax to the match which it had seemed must end in the crowning of a new champion. Lewis, a towering figure beside the comparatively little contender, repeatedly showed signs of faltering and his one time deadly scissor proved ineffective against the younger man's headlocks.

Lewis resorted to his famous strangle holds without avail. Before the first fall Sonnenberg dived in to but Lewis in the stomach. Then he lifted the champion from his feet with the flying tackle and slammed the strangler's huge bulk to the mat to take the first fall in 37 minutes and 30 seconds. The champion was out for five minutes.

The start of the second session saw Sonnenberg fresh and eager but the champion was weak. Twice Sonnenberg, dived in and Lewis dodged but on the third attempt the Dartmouth boy hurtled himself through the ropes and out onto the floor.

Still screaming, the prisoners were driven slowly to separate points on the outskirts of town and hanged.

A third negro, taken from the jail by mistake, was released without injury. He returned to his cell.

LONGEST TELEPHONE CONVERSATION RECORDED

The record for the greatest distance the human voice ever has traveled over a telephone was made recently when a telephone conversation was effected between Yakima, Wash., and Stockholm, Sweden, a distance of 8,396 miles.

This information was received yesterday by H. R. Risley, division commercial manager for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company for Oregon, in a telegram from officials of the American Telephone company, announcing the extension of trans-Atlantic telephone service to Mexico City, and four other Mexican cities.

The greatest distance which the human voice will travel in the establishment of this new service is 8,181 miles, the telegram stated. "This is just 125 miles short of the greatest distance over which telephone conversation has been effected, which was in the case of a recent call from Yakima, Wash., to Stockholm, a distance of 8,396 miles."

Conversation from the Mexican points, the telegram pointed out, would be over the International Telephone and Telegraph lines of the Mexican Telephone and Telegraph company connecting with the long distance lines of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, then to New York and over the trans-oceanic radio telephone.

Residents in the Mexican cities given the new service, it was added, will be able to have regular telephonic contact with 250,000,000 of the world's inhabitants, or with any one of approximately 25,000,000 of the world's 31,000,000 telephones.

PORTLAND YOUTH SETS ENDURANCE FLIGHT RECORD

SEASIDE, Ore., June 30.—Establishing a mark for other fliers to shoot at, Jimmy Bluehart, 18 year old Portland aviator, last night set a world's record for endurance flight for airplanes of the OX-5 class, when he remained aloft for 16 hours 34 minutes 25.210 seconds. The flight was recorded and certified by Lieut. Valentine Gephart of Seattle, representative of the Federation International, and secretary of the National Aeronautic society.

No previous officially recognized record had existed for the 90 horsepower class plane in which Bluehart set a mark. The unofficial record had stood at 12 hours 32 minutes.

Ten gallons of gasoline yet remained in the tanks of Bluehart's plane when he landed. This would have been sufficient for a flight of one and one-half hours' duration.

The young flier decided, however, to come down as darkness fell, as he feared he might hit someone in the large crowd that had gathered on the beach.

Perfect flying conditions existed during the flight.

FAMINE DRIVING PEASANTS FROM PLAIN OF KONIA

(Associated Press Local Wire)

KONIA, Turkey, June 30.—A cry of famine is rising from thousands of peasants in the Konia plain who have been ruined by drought which followed an exceptionally bitter winter and the Turkish government is confronted by a more serious rescue problem than was caused by the recent earthquake.

About 80 per cent of the peasants have abandoned their farms. They are migrating toward the city trying to sell their cattle, sometimes as low as for two dollar apiece and accusing famine profiteers of rushing from other cities to Konia. President Mustafa Kemal yesterday sent the minister of the interior to Konia to organize relief measures while the Red Crescent is sending trainloads of food to the starving peasants, many of whom are now eating grass.

The president is desperately anxious to hold the peasants from abandoning the Konia, fearing that

the region could never be repopulated.

JAPANESE AND CHINESE IN CLASH AT TSINAN

PEKING, June 30.—Japanese reports from Tsinan tell of a series of minor clashes between the Japanese and Chinese there.

One Japanese soldier and one Chinese were killed and others wounded in one of the clashes while another Chinese was shot in the head after throwing a grenade at a Japanese sentry. A Nationalist brigade commander was said to be among those wounded in one of the fights.

Another Japanese sentry was wounded by a sniper and the Japanese military authorities have arrested a dozen Chinese for examination in the affair.

The Japanese charged that Nationalist plain clothes men and propagandists are stirring bitter news against Japan.

POLES WILL TRY ATLANTIC FLIGHT

PARIS, June 30.—Satisfied with their last flights, the Polish air men Idzkowsky and Kubala flew from Villa Comblay to Le Bourget today. They will take off from the latter place for a trans-Atlantic flight to the United States as soon as conditions are favorable.
