JOHNSTOWN, Colo., June 30.—An automobile raced a tornado Friday—and won. Warned by the approach of the funnel shaped,

PLANT QUARANTINE BOARD WILL MEET IN SALEM

SALEM, June 30.—For the first time since its organization 19 years ago the western plant quarantine board will hold its annual session this year in Oregon, says an announcement by Charles A. Park, president of the state board of horticulture. The three-day session will be held in Salem July 12, 13 and 14.

Delegates from 11 western states and from Mexico, Hawaii and British Columbia will attend. Among the subjects discussed will be the protection of agriculture by Garcia Robledo of Mexico City and control of the European earwig, by Prof. M. B. McKay of Oregon State College.
