AVERY HOPWOOD, PLAYWRIGHT, DIES IN FRENCH SURF

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NICE, France, July 2.—Avery Hopwood, American playwright, was drowned within sight of life savers and while the crowd on the beach watched last night at Juan les Pins, on the French Riviera.

Hopwood, apparently in good health, went swimming at 8 o'clock soon after dinner. He collapsed when far from the shore and drowned before help could reach him.

Graduating from the University of Michigan in 1907, Hopwood went to New York as special correspondent for the Cleveland Leader and almost immediately sold his first play, "Clothes," written in collaboration with Channing Pollock and produced in 1906. He was 24 years old at the time, having been born in Cleveland in 1882.

His best known plays were "Fair and Warmer," "The Gold Digger" and "The Bat," written in collaboration with Mary Roberts Rinehart. "The Bat" was one of the biggest money-makers ever staged.

LAMB GRADING MEETINGS LAST WEEK SUCCESSFUL

A very successful lamb grading demonstration was conducted last week at Yoncalla, Elkton and Days Creek. R. L. Clark, secretary of the livestock exchange of Portland, was the principal speaker. H. A. Lindgren, of the animal husbandry department of the state college, and County Agent J. C. Leedy, also participating. The meetings were held under the auspices of the extension service of the college.

Mr. Clark emphasized the importance of grading lambs before placing them upon the market. He suggested that she sheep men cater to the market rather than to personal preference, particularly with regard to type and breed of sheep. He demonstrated methods of grading sheep, showing the points necessary for good market lambs. There were about 25 growers present for each meeting.

FRENCH TENNIS

ACES AND TILDEN VANQUISH RIVALS

WIMBLEDON, July 2.—William T. Tilden, American tennis ace, advanced to the semi-final round of the Wimbledon championship tournament today by defeating Jean Borotra, of the French "three musketeers" by scores of 8-6, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2.—Henri Cochet, sharp-shooting French musketeer, advanced to the semi-finals today in defense of the Wimbledon men's singles by conquering the young American tennis star, John Hennessy, in four sets, 6-4, 6-1, 5-7, 6-3.

Cochet's victory over Hennessy turned the tables and gave the Frenchman revenge for his set back at the hands of the American in the United States championship at Forest Hills last September. It also assured France of three of the four semi-final brackets.

Rene La Coste, French star, defeated Baron H. L. de Morpurgo, ace of the Italian Davis cup team, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-4, 6-4, to enter the semi-final round.

Twelve thousand fans packed the stands around the center court as Digby Tilden and Jean Borotra began their match which promised a tennis "natural."

The pounding Frenchman got away to a fast start, taking the first game from Tilden. It was a deuced session of slashing shots.

Tilden, serving, won the second game although Borotra brought it to deuce first. Slashing out with his famous cannon-ball service, the American took the deciding point of the game with a stinging ace.

The colorful Borotra in his black beret, was on his toes every instant, bounding like a panther after Tilden's fierce drives.

Games followed service until they stood at 3-2 with Borotra leading. He then broke through the American's delivery to lead by four games to two.

Borotra tried to give Tilden a point on a ball apparently called incorrectly by a linesman, but Tilden would not take it. Borotra then begged two of Tilden's services into the stands.
