FORTUNE IN MINE CERTIFICATES IN CORPSE'S POCKETS

(Associated Press Local Wire)
PORTLAND, July 3.—Mining
stock certificates with a purported
value of \$1,650,000 were in possession
of a man identified as M. J.
Connelly, 60, whose crushed body
was found under a shipment of
steel pipe in a railroad gondola
eight car here last night. The
stock was in the Connelly Extended
Quartz Mining company of
Nome, Alaska.

The certificates were turned
over to stock brokers today for
them to determine whether they
had any value. Connelly's name
was signed as president of the
company. The secretary's
name, also signed, was J. F. Win-
ter.

In a pocket of the man's clothing
was found a safety deposit box
receipt from the Bank of Italy of
Oakland, Calif., dated Dec. 13,
1927, and signed "Skeddie."
The coroner who investigated
the man's death believed he had
been killed by the shifting load of
steel pipe. The possibility that he
had been in the car when the pipe
was loaded was said remote.

The car was loaded at Oakland,
Calif., and consigned to Silverton,
3, C.
