CONTRACT TILLER CUT-OFF ROAD TO BE LET FOR \$25,717.50

The contract for the construction of the new section of the Tiller Trail cut-off road is to be let to Rust and Company of Portland. It is the county court's approval is given, according to a message received today from the state highway department. The project was recently offered for bids, but all the proposals were too high, so the work was readvertised, the section being made one mile shorter. The bid of Rust and Company for this section was \$25,717.50. The Bureau of Public Roads recommended that this bid be accepted, and the contract will probably be let to that firm. The county court is required to concur in the agreement but will undoubtedly accept the bureau's recommendation. It is expected that work will start immediately.

ANCIENT BEE TREE MASONIC CEMETERY REMOVED TODAY

The old bee tree in the Masonic cemetery is no more. The tree has for many years been one of the sights of the cemetery, the spreading black oak being of great size and casting a shade over a large area.

In recent years the core has become rotten, due partly to natural decay, augmented by the operation of a swarm of wild bees, operating inside the hollow trunk. Yesterday one whole side of the tree split off and fell, dropping in to a section where there were many costly gravestones, marking the resting places of some of the county's pioneers.

In some, which seems almost miraculous, the tons of crashing wood, despite the fact that the branches covered a wide area, did not injure a single stone or cause any damage of any kind.

Fearing that the other half of the tree might fall, the caretakers are today removing the remaining portions of the oak, so that no damage will result.

The bees that have long occupied the trunk of the tree, swarmed on a branch of the remaining portion for a number of hours, but finally sought a new home.

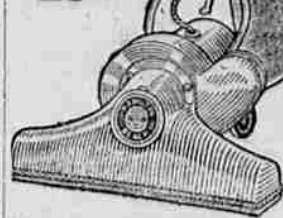

HOOVER PREPARES TO GIVE VIEWS ON LIQUOR AND FARMS

(Associated Press Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 3.—Secretary Hoover began yesterday what is expected to be his last full week as head of the commerce department.

Under present plans, he will leave the capital about July 10, for his home in California, stopping on the way to present his resignation to President Coolidge at the summer White House in Wisconsin.

The republican national committee is making all arrangements for the journey which is to be made on a special train, so large is the party which will accompany the presidential nominee. The exact itinerary has yet to be definitely mapped out.

A committee of Californians, headed by Governor Young, is to meet Mr. Hoover at Reno, Nev., or some other point, depending upon the route chosen, and escort him to San Francisco. It is planned that Mr. Hoover will respond to their greeting at Oakland, possibly making his first public address since his nomination.

Refreshed by a quiet week-end, Mr. Hoover turned again today to his speech accepting the nomination, which is to be delivered upon a special train, so large is the party which will accompany the presidential nominee. The exact itinerary has yet to be definitely mapped out.

It is understood that Mr. Hoover has completed drafting the sections of the address dealing with the agricultural situation and that his next subject is prohibition. There is a prevalent belief, too, that he intends dealing unequivocally with this issue, and that in addition to supporting the platform plank pledging right enforcement, he will warmly endorse the fundamental principles of prohibition.

In this connection, it is revealed that as secretary of commerce, Mr. Hoover two years ago declared prohibition a great contributory factor in American industrial efficiency.

CHURCHES OPPOSE SMITH

TURNER, Ore., July 2.—Opposition to the democratic nominee for president, though Governor Smith's name was not mentioned, was evoked in a resolution here today at the annual state convention of Christian churches.

The resolution said: "This convention of Christian churches of Oregon representing 25,000 members, unanimously affirms our undying devotion to the 18th amendment and the Volstead act as it now stands, and urges every member of the Christian churches of Oregon to disregard party lines and to vote for no one for the presidency of the United States who does not positively and unreservedly commit himself to the support of the 18th amendment and the Volstead act without any modifications whatsoever."

July 4th Is Significant Date in National History

It is a historical coincidence that July 4—the greatest patriotic date in the history of the nation—is also the date of an unusually large number of other important historical events besides the signing of the Declaration of Independence July 4, 1776.

The date first appears in American history in 1636, when Roger Williams settled Providence, R. I. A very little more than a century later—in 1754—it appears again as the day when Benjamin Franklin proposed a far-sighted plan for a Colonial congress.

Just two years later to the day, the colonies felt themselves so firmly welded together that they signed the instrument which challenged all Britain to war. It is, of course, this latter act, in 1776, that makes July 4 the beloved holiday that it is, and it is also this act that undoubtedly robbed those other July 4 events of deserved prominence, because it so greatly overshadowed them.

Hawthorne's Birthday
Nathaniel Hawthorne, whose novels give us an insight into the human side of early America, was born on July 4, 1804. On this date in this year, the first weekly mail stages began to run between Philadelphia and Pittsburgh—a tremendous journey in that day.

AMERICAN BALLOONS ARE
BEATEN IN BENNETT RACE

DETROIT, July 2.—The race for the James Gordon Bennett international balloon trophy was unrivaled today to France and Germany. Karl Betts, the official scorer for the race, announced, following receipt of a message that the U. S. Army balloon had landed at 12:20 p. m. at Kenbridge, Va.

The only balloon not reported landed and believed still aloft late today was the German entry, Munster.

America's hopes for retaining the coveted trophy were shattered when the French balloon, Blanchard, landed at Walnut Cove, N. C., considerably farther from the starting point than where the American balloon had landed.

SALEM KING'S PRODUCTS PLANT FACES LAWSUIT

SALEM, July 2.—T. M. Hicks of Salem today filed suit to foreclose on a tax delinquency lien against the Salem King's Products plant to recover \$20,997.99. In part this amount, he alleges, covers taxes

and street assessments, he has paid. The suit is brought against the Title and Trust company, a defendant, this company claiming an interest in the properties through foreclosure of a \$225,000 mortgage. After the foreclosure of this mortgage, stockholders brought suits to have it set aside. There are other pending suits.

WATER AT UMPQUA PARK BEACH IS FOUND UNSAFE

The water at Umpqua Park has been found polluted and unfit for swimming, according to Dr. W. Wall Payne, county health officer. Samples of the water were taken recently and sent to the state board of health for examination, with the result that the bacterial count was found to be such that the river at that point was declared unsafe for swimming purposes. Placards warning the public of the danger of swimming in the water have been posted along the bank of the river. This beach, which is the only place in the South Umpqua near the city, suitable for swimming purposes, has been very popular and the fact that it can no longer be safely used will be keenly felt during the summer months.
