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WIVES OF PATRIOTS OF '76 PAID FOR HUSBANDS' GLORY

Invading British Wreaked Vengeance on Women Whose Husbands Signed Declaration of Independence.



Though her husband was not among the signers of the Declaration of Independence, Martha Washington lived in imminent danger of a British raid on Mount Vernon. The same strokes of the pen which brought immortal fame to the 51 married signers of the Declaration of Independence, brought persecution, imprisonment and—in some cases—death to their wives.

In all cases it brought weeks and months of loneliness and danger, for while their husbands were devoting their time and energies to the establishment of a new nation, the wives were left alone by their friends—cut off usually by long journeys from the scenes of their husbands' stirring activities.

From a historical standpoint, however, nothing that they were forced to endure during these times was so cruel as the forgetfulness which succeeding generations have accorded their memory.

Martha Washington, Martha Jefferson—yes, her name was Martha, too—Elizabeth Adams, and all the rest are seldom thought of as

having played any significant part at all in the drama in which their husbands gained so much fame.

Martha Washington's Plight

Yes, Martha Washington lived virtually alone at Mount Vernon for weeks in imminent danger of a raid upon the homestead which Lord Dunmore, who was heckling the settlements along the coast of Virginia at the time, openly boasted he intended to make to take Martha prisoner.

After she finally was rescued from her lonely home, Martha became an angel of mercy to the soldiers at Valley Forge and did much to keep their spirits from falling as low as the temperature during those bleak winter months.

Martha Washington, after the death of her husband, destroyed every bit of personal correspondence that ever passed between the two. Historians have sought to attach all sorts of significance to this rather natural act. Some modern writers have sought to

draw from it proof for the assumption that the two were unhappily married. Others, that it proved the opposite—that they were extremely happy and that Washington shared with his wife his every hope, fear and ambition, and that these were too intimately recorded in his letters to her to stand public scrutiny.

Fled From British
Martha Jefferson died in 1782—a year after she was forced to flee from a sick bed and flee from invading British troops while her husband was governor of Virginia.

She became steadily worse after this removal and Thomas Jefferson blamed her death upon the English. He never married again, in keeping with a promise he made her on her death-bed. Perhaps it was because of the memory of what she had done to help him become great. But history is silent on the subject.

Samuel Adams, at the time of his marriage to Elizabeth Wells, was a poverty-stricken widower with two children. There were some contemporaries who called him shiftless.

After his marriage to Elizabeth, Adams began the long climb which was to give him fame. Indications remain which seem to prove that Mrs. Adams was perhaps more active in helping her husband than any other wife of that time. She is credited with having rescued him from poverty and at a time when state matters were claiming most of his attention.

Accused of Treason
Elizabeth Annesley Lewis, wife of Francis Lewis, a signer, was the first victim of an order which was posted in every British post and issued to every Tory in the colonies. It declared that the signing of the Declaration of Independence had made 108 Americans guilty of "treason." These were the 51 signers and the wives of the 51 of that number who were married.

Complying with this order, a Captain Birch was given specific orders to raid Lewis' home in Whitestone, Long Island, at a time when it was known that Lewis was away and to "seize the lady and destroy the property."

Elizabeth Lewis became a prisoner in a filthy building in New York City. Her cell had no bed. For three weeks she was allowed no change of clothing; allowed to communicate with no one. Finally, an old negro servant discovered her plight. He smuggled articles of clothing to her and carried out letters to her friends.

Threaten British Wives
Congress demanded of the British authorities that they accord her better treatment. The demand was ignored until Washington carried out his threat to arrest and imprison the wives of two prominent British authorities in Philadelphia. He sent word that unless Mrs. Lewis was released these English women would be accorded identical treatment. Mrs. Lewis was released from prison, but was not allowed to leave New York.

She remained there for weeks without the bare necessities of life. When at last she was allowed to join her husband in Philadelphia, her family had barely enough time to reach her bedside before she died of illness contracted in prison.

Many more of the "wives of the 51" were forced by the British to flee their homes.

HEALTH BULLETIN

Swimming in Polluted Water

(Co. Health Dept.)

Eye and ear infections are very frequently caused by swimming, and as this sport is very popular during this season, it is well that some very beneficial information be published.

Chronic sinus infection in individuals may be acquired by swimming in contaminated water. Even in clear water serious sinus trouble may result from the pressure of water forcing any infection already present back into the nose, throat and ears, and sudden pressure being caused by diving or by being unsuspectingly "ducked" by some friends.

If sinus infection is once acquired, it is very difficult to treat, and an operation is sometimes necessary. Even this means of last resort is not always a satisfactory cure; therefore, the ultimate cure for sinus trouble is prevention. As the sinus is not always fully developed until puberty, it is at this age that it is most important that everything possible be done to avoid original infection which may last an individual's life.

The observance of the following few rules may prevent many serious difficulties along this line:

(1) Hold your nose when diving.

(2) Avoid high or deep water diving.

(3) Avoid snuffing any water through the nose.

(4) Do not swallow any water and get as little in the mouth as possible.

(5) Use rubber ear stoppers, a water-tight bathing cap, or un-

bleached wool or oiled cotton earplugs.

(6) Be sure the water is pure. If you are in doubt about the purity of the water in which you are in the habit of swimming, call at the office of the health department in the court house and ask for a container for a water specimen. The water will be sent to the State Board of Health and within three days you will receive a report.

The water in every swimming pool should be constantly chlorinated, for even though the water may be pure when it is put in the tank, the water is quickly contaminated by swimmers.

The health department gives the following weekly report. 7 Cases communicable diseases, 9 cases released, 3 epidemiological investigations, 12 water samples taken, 2 prenatal calls, 2 maternity calls, 4 pre-school visits, 2 infant visits, 6 school child visits, 29 nurses' conferences, 8 nurses' investigations, 2 child clinics with total attendance of 24, 3 visits county home, 1 home visit by health officer, 3 visits to county jail, 3 indigent patients treated, 5 office conferences, 53 letters sent out, 18 office hour health officer, 37 telephone calls, and a total of 1023 miles traveled by two nurses, Miss Erickson and Miss Atwood, and the health officer, Dr. DeWalt Payne.
