MAN HUNT SEQUEL TO TAVERN FIGHT

SPOKANE, Wash., July 5.—Authorities here today have appealed to police officers throughout the west to aid in the hunt for Adolph Rosenau, alias Jack La France, alleged to have murdered Harry Warner by stabbing him with a butcher knife at the Colonial Tavern, near here yesterday. Further questioning of witnesses of the slaying revealed that Rosenau became "wild with anger" when he had received a black eye at the hands of Warner during a scuffle.

The quarrel is said to have started over tips Warner gave a member of the orchestra. The two men fought first with fists and then Rosenau is alleged to have attempted to hit Warner with a spade after they had been put out of the tavern by Archie Cook, the proprietor. When others intervened and took the spade from Rosenau, Warner is said to have bludgeoned his eye. Rosenau then rushed to the kitchen and returned with three butcher knives, and began chasing Warner. He caught him on the lawn of the tavern and there, while witnesses heard Warner "begging for mercy," Rosenau stabbed him through the heart.

COSTLY STORMS SWEEP SECTIONS OF INDIANA

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 5.—An electrical, wind and rain storm which struck the north, eastern and central parts of the state last night, caused damage which today was unestimated, but believed to have run into thousands of dollars. Interurban and telephone and telegraph service throughout the northern and eastern parts of the state was crippled a greater portion of the night. The heavy rains caused trains and interurbans to move cautiously, making some routes several hours late. Officials of the Big Four and Pennsylvania railroads reported wire communications with several cities were severed.

ers all along the coast between Fort Mardyk and the Bray Dunes have been directed to search for Capt. Lowenstein's body. Fishing boats were dragging the channel with nets but without result.

Suicide Idea Scouted

BRUSSELS, Belgium, July 5.—Rumors that Capt. Lowenstein, killed in a fall from his private plane last night, was a possible suicide were energetically denied today at the financier's office in Brussels.

It was stated that the captain was not alone at the head of his numerous affairs whose direction and responsibility was shared by several prominent financiers, including J. Henry Schroder Bank and corporation of New York. From the financial viewpoint, it was said, Capt. Lowenstein's affairs will proceed as usual.

The belief in Brussels was that Capt. Lowenstein was the victim of a tragic mistake in that he apparently mistook the door by which passengers leave the plane for the entrance to the washroom and in the darkness jumped from the machine.

Wrong Door Open

From the main cabin of the plane, a door opens toward a passage in which there are two other doors. That on the right leads to the lavatory and that on the left is the exit from the plane. The distance between the two doors is scarcely two feet. When Capt. Lowenstein's valet went to seek the financier he discovered that the latter had opened the wrong door and had fallen from the plane.

Pilot Drew, who was in charge of the Lowenstein plane, said that no one was quite sure as to the exact spot where the financier fell from the plane. "Captain Lowenstein left Croyden in his Fokker airplane at 6.08 last night," Drew said. "When the machine was passing over the North Sea between Dunkirk and the Belgian coast, I was handed a note by Lowenstein's secretary, M. Hodgen, informing me that Capt. Lowenstein had fallen overboard. I immediately landed near St. Ingelvert and proceeded to Fort Mardyk where, after informing the customs officials, I telephoned Dunkirk to have a search made for the body. This was of little use as when the accident must have taken place, the machine was flying at a height of about 4,000 feet. No one was quite sure of the exact spot where he could have fallen."

Widow Discards Plane

CALAIS, France, July 5.—Mme. Lowenstein, who arrived here this morning, ordered that the plane on which her husband was lost, return to London.

Heavy Debt Revealed

BRUSSELS, July 5.—The newspaper L'Independence Belge says that Capt. Alfred Lowenstein, killed last night in a fall from his private plane, had important liabilities in Brussels and had tried unsuccessfully to obtain a L1,000,000 loan in London.

Hoover Calls Confab

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Clearing the way for an early departure from the capital, Secretary Hoover plans to confer on Saturday with prominent eastern republicans for the purpose of establishing a campaign organization in that section.

All members of the republican national committee from the north-eastern states and from Pennsylvania and Maryland have been called to Washington for the meeting and Senator Moses of New Hampshire also is to be present. Moses, who served as permanent chairman of the Kansas City convention, is expected to be named eastern campaign manager.

With the eastern situation provided for, Mr. Hoover will be practically in a position to leave for the west. In this connection an announcement yesterday repeated emphatically that his program had been definitely arranged and that he will deliver his resignation from the cabinet to President Coolidge at the summer White House.

Rumors as to his plans beyond this outline were pronounced unjustified.**Norris Legend Spiked**

A report that Secretary Hoover had offered the vice presidential nomination to Senator Norris of Nebraska, while the convention was still in progress received an emphatic denial. A semi-official commerce department statement branded the story as "preposterous and silly," and reiterated that Mr. Hoover had taken no part in the choice of a vice presidential nominee.

The Commerce Secretary Spent the Holiday in Rest and Relaxation
