Modest Apparel Decried for Irish Colleens

Regulations Committed by Pope Ban Extravagant Exposure and Brazen Conduct.

LIMERICK, Ireland, July 5.—(A. P.)—Irish colleens are laid down by the Irish Modest Dress and Department Crusade recently instigated here and officially commended by the Pope.

The regulations, they say, speak for themselves and need no further comment. Here they are: No dresses are to be worn which are: Less than 4 inches below the knee (measured when kneeling.) Cut in a suggestive style or so loosely or low as to offend modesty; therefore not lower than the collar bone for church, wear and not more than one inch below it at any time.

Without sleeves sufficiently long to cover at least half the upper arm at any time, nor without sleeves to the wrist for church wear.

Of transparent material unless a non-transparent slip, complying with the above regulations, be worn.

Women must abstain from: Immodest postures; Loud talking or hysterical laughing in public and coarse or irreverent expressions; Alcoholic drink at dances or entertainments; Improper cinema shows, plays, etc.

Anything opposed to modesty in what relates to sea-bathing, and they should show their disapproval of same.

Elk 61 Years to Attend Lodge Convention.

M. B. Leavitt, Veteran Minstrel and Producer, One of the Original Jolly Corks.

(Associated Press Local Wire) MIAMI, Fla., July 5.—"The grand old man of Elkdom," M. B. Leavitt, 55 years old, plans to greet his brother lodge members at the national convention in Miami, July 2. Leavitt is the oldest member of the Elks order in length of membership. He is a resident of Miami.

In 1907 Leavitt was a member of the Jolly Corks, a theatrical society in New York which took its name from the burnt cork used by minstrel show performers. From this society the Elks' order, now numbering more than 800,000 members, originated. Leavitt was the second man to subscribe to the new charter and in 1879 he became a member of Lodge No. 1, the first Elks lodge. Later he was elected to life membership.

As a theatrical performer and producer, the veteran minstrel was known from coast to coast. With the late W. H. Crane he established the first minstrel troupe in the United States. He founded the first chain of theatres in America and in 1868 took the first theatrical troupe on the first transcontinental train to San Francisco.

This organization witnessed the historic exercises when the Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads came together and the last spike was driven at Promontory Point. Henry M. Stanley, later famed as an African explorer, was press agent for Leavitt's show, and David Belasco was an usher in one of Leavitt's early San Francisco theatres, where he met David Ward.

Leavitt was born in Pozno, Poland, but was brought to Boston by his parents in infancy.
