

SELF HELP PLAN FOR FARMERS IS BEING STUDIED

Cooperative Institute to
Deal With Problem at
Coming Meeting.

JULY 16 OPENING DAY

Way of Marketing Surplus
Crops With Minimum
of Federal Help
Is Sought.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 6.—Those who would solve agricultural ills through some plan of federal aid that encourages "self help" among farmers, are focusing attention on forthcoming sessions of the American Institute of Cooperation, formed four years ago on the theory that economic difficulties could be settled by a cooperative movement.

The platforms of both major political parties take cognizance of the fact that profitable and orderly disposition must be made of surplus farm products. Divergence of opinion is based primarily on the method to pursue. It is recognized that whatever may be done by the party that is successful in November is debatable.

G. O. P. Stands Pat
Charles W. Holman, secretary of the institute, holds that the course taken by a democratic administration is open to conjecture, whereas the republicans are generally conceded to stand on the Coolidge policy—the same that twice defeated the McNary-Haugen plan to employ an equalization fee for marketing farm surplus.

"Thus, the general situation," Holman says, "lends particular significance to deliberations of the American Institute of Cooperation, which, aligned with more than 1,500,000 farmers who are members of local and national cooperatives whose annual business amounts to well above \$2,500,000, may develop the key for agricultural relief."

Test Is Coming
Whether the "self help" movement will be capable of meeting the test in handling surplus, even with government aid, will be among vital questions that cooperative leaders will discuss after the institute has finished its week of inspections at various points in California and assembled at Berkeley on July 16 for two weeks of successive sessions.

Another issue confronting the institute is the extent to which cooperatives handling different commodities can work together in a national way for protective purposes and particularly for federal legislation. A special session has been arranged for spokesmen of these different commodity groups to compare ideas, to outline the extent to which their organizations may have common problems and to discuss the possibility of working together through some national medium to bring about better economic conditions.

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, a foremost advocate of the cooperative movement as a potential solution for present farm troubles, will be one of the principal speakers at the institute.

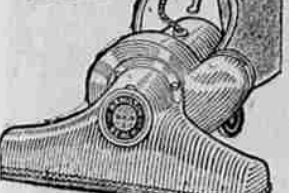

OVARION REWARDS HOOVER FOR SPEECH TO HIGHWAY BODY

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 6.—Secretary Hoover was given an ovation here today when he made a brief address before the traffic ordinance committee of the national conference on street and highway safety of which he is chairman.

The republican presidential candidate told the committee that their efforts toward adoption of uniform laws were making headway and that the plan eventually would be accepted.

The secretary said ten states had adopted the main recommendations of the conference and that 15 or 20 others were considering the plan and likely to approve it. Mr. Hoover was engaged today in bringing the purpose of his personal persuasion to bear on the task of completing the republican national organization, James A. Good of Chicago, his pre-convention campaign manager, who has been urged to take the leadership in the western election campaign was given an hour with the secretary.

Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire, who has been reported as probable eastern manager, followed Mr. Good in, and Henry J. Allen of Kansas, who has been selected to manage the national committee's publicity campaign, also conferred with him.

KLANSMEN'S "PISTOLS" ONLY WOODEN BLUFF

NEW YORK, July 6.—The New York Times today says the large "pistol" which uniformed members of the Ku Klux Klan carried prominently in holsters at a Long Island rally on July 4th, were made of wood and carried merely for "psychological effect."

The quotes an unnamed Klan official as saying: "The casual observer will see the butt of the pistol protruding and if intent upon cowardly or trouble will change his mind."

CHINA'S FOUR CHIEFS PLEDGE FEALTY BEFORE TOMB OF SUN-YAT-SEN

PEKING, July 6.—With the full mysticism of the orient in its most dramatic form, the four most powerful military leaders of the nationalist movement in China today stood before the tomb of the late Dr. Sun-Yat-Sen and presented an account of their stewardship in the nationalist cause to the founder of the Chinese nationalist movement.

Nationalist's military big 4, Chiang Kai-Shek, Feng Yu-Hsiang, Yen Hsi-Shan and Li Tsung-Jen, united to devote homage before the remains of the late leader, reporting to the spirit of the father of the nationalist cause the successful completion of the military stages of the Chinese revolution as he envisioned it, and pleaded to him/loyal co-operation to achieve the reconstruction of their country along the lines which he had pointed out.

PORTLAND PLANS RECORD LIVESTOCK SHOW THIS YEAR

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—With very largely increased stakes this year, made possible through the generous response of the four daily newspapers of Portland, the Chamber of Commerce, banks, and other business interests of this city, there is every indication that the Pacific International horse show, to be held in connection with the Pacific International Livestock Exposition next November, will be the largest and best ever held here.

A total of \$40,000 has been provided for the stakes, and plans are in course of preparation to expand the horse show, obtain more entries and to interest more people than ever in this feature. It is believed by A. C. Ruby, President of the Exposition, and his associates that there are practically unlimited possibilities in building up the horse show feature. There is a notable increased interest in horses, it is held by those who have made a study of the situation, and it is believed that many thousands of people from the Northwest in particular and the entire country in general will respond to the invitation of the Exposition officials to come to Portland this year to enjoy not only the livestock exhibits, but to witness the numerous thrilling events of the horse show.

President Ruby has announced the judges for the horse show, which is to be held in North Portland November 3 to 10. Richard V. Lusk, of Montreal, Canada, and Robert Penborton, of Chicago, widely known experts in their line, are the two who will officiate this year over the distribution of the \$40,000 of prizes in more than a score of classes.

The committee in charge of the horse show this year consists of Mr. Ruby, Julius L. Meier, C. E. Grell and W. F. Turner, of Portland, and Dr. Walter A. Moore, of Seattle. In addition to this committee, O. M. Plummer is secretary and general manager of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, and A. P. Fleming is manager of the Night Horse show.

The matter of obtaining improved transportation facilities for hauling the huge crowds to the show grounds from the downtown districts has been receiving careful consideration at the hands of the committee, and Mr. Ruby has asked the president of the Portland Electric Power Company to put on a bus service to augment street car facilities during the show week.
