## THE NEW COURTHOUSE

Award of a contract for the construction of Douglas county's new combined courthouse and jail comes a year late, owing to legal requirements, but it is none the less welcome. And there is additional cause for satisfaction in that the two principal items of the contract have been awarded to Roseburg contractors, thus assuring a preference to Douglas county labor, which is as it should be. Disbursements of approximately \$200,000 in this county for labor and material on this big job during the next six months or longer—probably April 1, 1929, at the longest—will stimulate business conditions and add mightily in swatting the bogey of industrial depression that always hovers about in presidential years. That there will be a hang-over of grief in some outside localities over the project is to be expected; not because of any honest denial that the absolute need of the new building exists, but because it may put a few extra dollars into circulation in the county seat. Since counties were first organized there always has been and always will be outside lament over any project, no matter how worthy or urgently needed, contributing to the financial welfare of the official headquarters of such units. The idea is almost traditional that because some needed improvement is to be made by a county seat a phase of graft at the expense of all the taxpayers is lurking somewhere, and that it should be opposed as a matter of principle, even without the formality of thorough and impartial investigation. The present courthouse plan in this city will stand the light of the most searching inquiry, from first to last detail. No proceeding in relation to it has been secret and the public records speak the truth to all who wish to consult them. For many years successive county grand juries, in their final reports, urged the construction of a new building, and the men who comprised such juries were representative of all the taxpayers of the county. Lack of sufficient funds made immediate compliance with the recommendation practically impossible. Time brought to the county the necessary money from the refund of taxes on the O' & C. R. R. land grant, and the project was at once started toward fruition. All necessary legal preliminaries have been properly met, the contract has been regularly awarded and when the building is ready for occupancy let there be a dedication that will witness the burial of all unjust sectional prejudice and morbid dislike.

KNITTING MILLS  
STRIKERS FACING  
COURT CHARGES

KENOSHA, Wis., July 7.—Forty-two men and women faced disorderly conduct charges today in connection with the Allen A. company strike disturbance, while union leaders went forward with new efforts of arbitration.

Louis Budenz, one of the leaders of the more than 200 full fashioned knitters on strike since February 18, announced the workers would submit their case to a group of Chicago citizens, including Miss Jane Addams of Hull House. The Allen A. company did not indicate whether it would approve such arbitration.

Twelve arrested 26 men and 16 women at the plant yesterday, charging they had been abusive to employees. All were released later under bond.

\$15,900 REWARD  
FOR D'AUTREMONT  
TRIO APPORTIONED

9 Persons, Including Half  
Blind Cripple Without  
Feet, Will Share  
in Money.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 7.—Apportionment of the reward money offered for the arrest of the three D'Autremont boys, who killed four men in a mail train robbery in the Siskiyou mountains of Oregon, Oct. 11, 1923, was announced here today by Charles Riddford, district chief of U. S. post office inspectors.

The apportionment was made under direction of Mr. Riddford, in whose hands was placed most of the responsibility of directing the great world-wide man hunt for the D'Autremonts, Roy, Ray and Mica.

The government offered \$6,000 and the Southern Pacific railroad, the express companies and the state of Oregon pooled enough to make the reward total \$15,900.

All rewards are to be apportioned on the same basis as those of the government, Riddford stated.

Thomas Reynolds, soldier living at San Francisco, is to get \$2,000 the entire amount offered by the government for the arrest of Hugh H. D'Autremont and enough of the rest to total \$5,300. Reynolds saw the three boys, a Dutch white servant in the Philippines and had him arrested at Manila, Feb. 11, 1927.

Albert Collinsworth of New Boston, Ohio, is to receive \$1,700 of government money and approximately \$4,130 altogether. Collinsworth, a cripple with both feet amputated and blind in one eye, recognized from pictures Roy and Ray D'Autremont, whom he identified as workers in a factory at Steubenville, Ohio.

Mrs. Emma L. Maynard, Portsmouth, Ohio, private detective who was called in by Collinsworth to assist him, is to receive the same amount.

Six Steubenville policemen who participated in the arrest are to receive \$1,000 each from the government offer for the arrest of Roy and Ray.

The notorious brothers are now serving sentences in the Oregon penitentiary at Salem.
