ROW IN TAMMANY CAMP MEANS PEACE JOB FOR AL SMITH

ALBANY, N. Y., July 6.—Senator Key Pittman of Nevada, the chairman of the committee appointed by the democratic national convention at Houston to notify Governor Al Smith of his nomination for the presidency, will arrive here tomorrow night and will spend Sunday at the executive mansion.

Governor Smith said that he was not announcing any of his plans subsequent to July 11, when the democratic national committee meets in New York City to fix the date for the formal notification ceremony and to discuss other arrangements.

One of Smith's first duties will be to act as peacemaker. Reports say that dissension has developed in the Smith camp between the strictly Tammany element and the Proskauer-Van Namee-Moskowitz group, so called. The reported dissension among the supporters was said to be based chiefly on the work of Supreme Court Justice M. Proskauer of New York, who has been dubbed the "Colonel Housekeeper" of the Smith campaign as a result of his activities at the Houston convention.

Open expression of dissatisfaction with the democratic platform, so far as labor is concerned, was reported to have been expressed by Peter Brady, prominent labor figure and head of a labor banking institution, to Justice Proskauer, who was credited with much of the responsibility for the platform. Old line Tammany men are said to have characterized as "high-handed" the handling of the Smith campaign by George Van Namee, Mrs. Henry D. Moskowitz, a close political adviser of the governor, is reported to have been criticized for not taking organization leaders sufficiently into confidence on affairs touching Smith's political future.

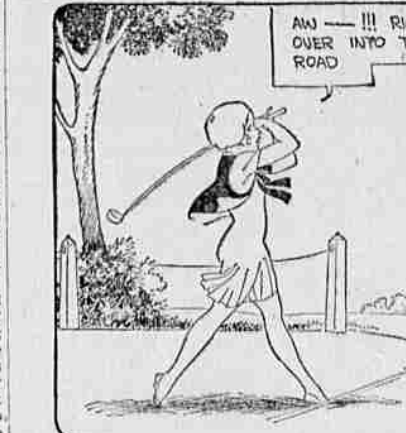
Back From Trip—

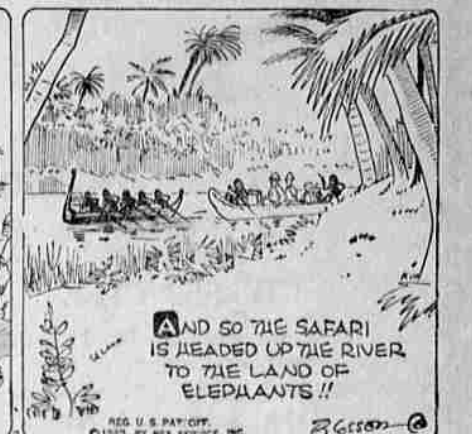

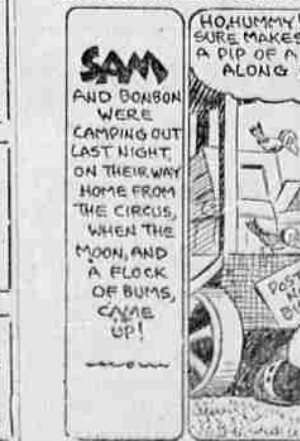
