MINER'S CORPSE MAY NOT BE THAT OF JACK MONROE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NEW YORK, July 7.—Doubt that the body of a man found in a cabin at Rouyn, Ont., was that of Jack Monroe, prospector and former heavyweight pugilist, was expressed from several sources today.

Mrs. Jack Monroe, wife of the man who stood up for four rounds before Jim Jeffries when the latter was world's heavyweight champion, said at Toronto that her husband had no interest in Rouyn and that he was looking over mining claims at Red Lake, Ont. But, she added, she had received no word from him in the last couple of days.

Canadian dispatches said Monroe's body was found by prospectors attracted to the cabin by the barking of a dog. The dispatches said the dead man apparently had been alone on his last expedition, but relatives here assert he never undertook such trips unaccompanied.

JUMPS INTO SEA TO END LIFE THEN YELLS FOR HELP

NEW YORK, July 7.—The steamship Rochambeau, due here Monday from Havre, has among other passengers, Morton Hoyt, member of a socially prominent Washington family, who jumped overboard off the Grand Banks and was rescued in twenty minutes.

At 8 o'clock last night when the ship was plowing its way through a dense fog, the cry, "Man overboard" was raised and it was learned that Hoyt had plunged into the Atlantic.

The vessel immediately turned in a complete circle and started back along its course with Captain

He said he regretted jumping overboard and asked that he be allowed to sleep. The jump and the rescue were described in radio advices to the Associated Press.

Mr. Hoyt is the son of the late Henry M. Hoyt, who served as secretary general of the United States in the Taft administration.

MONKEY KILLING BUTLER FREED OF CRUELTY CHARGE

HICKSVILLE, N. Y., July 7.—A butler who shot and killed a monkey today stood acquitted of a charge of cruelty to animals.

Felix Solomon, who was employed at the Brookville summer home of Mr. and Mrs. Verne Reed of Denver, killed the animal on June 28 after it had escaped from the neighboring estate of N. J. Hess, New York real estate man. Solomon was defended by former Governor Nathan L. Miller and his trial attracted a crowded court room of Long Island society folks from the Oyster Bay district.

Solomon contended he killed the monkey when he saw it creeping upon two of the Reed children. The monkey, he said, was showing its teeth and he feared it would bite the children. Hess insisted the monkey was harmless and that Solomon should have frightened it away instead of shooting it. Mr. Miller argued that legally monkeys were wild animals and Solomon had a right to kill.

Miller read newspaper stories to the jury about the death of King Alexander of Greece from a monkey's bite. The prosecutor argued that monkeys were harmless pets.

JUDGE BEAN TAKES BANK SUIT UNDER ADVISEMENT

PORTLAND, July 7.—Federal Judge Bean today took under advisement the \$58,000 damage suit brought by two stockholders of the now defunct Northwestern National Bank here against directors of the institution. Fred A. Ballin and Charles A. Burckhardt, plaintiffs, allege carelessness on the part of the directors and charge the carelessness resulted in a loss to the stockholders.

Closing arguments in the case were concluded last night. The case was tried without a jury. It was expected the court would require at least one week to prepare the opinion.

AL SMITH ASKS JIM REED FOR CAMPAIGN AID

Gov. Smith's friends in undoubtedly propaganda intended to cover up and draw attention away from the dissenion in the republican camp," he said.

Senator William R. King of Utah was one of the callers at Smith headquarters yesterday. He predicted that the Rocky mountain states would be in the Smith column in November.

"I am confident the party will carry many states this year, that it has not carried in the last few campaigns," he said.

Dissension in Texas

DALLAS, Tex., July 7.—Texas democrats seeking to check a bolt of persons dissatisfied with the nomination of Gov. Alfred E. Smith, have met their first major reversal in an announcement which said they would not support the New York governor and would remain in the July primary ballots.

D. C. Wilcox, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, made this announcement yesterday after national committeeman Jed C. Adams, had requested him to call a special meeting of the committee to place in the hands of the committee of all persons in sympathy with the national ticket and to consider the barring from the primary of persons not in sympathy with it. Among those who said they would not vote for Gov. Smith are Judge William Hawkins and Mrs. Hawkins, both candidates for governor, and Thomas B. Love, candidate for lieutenant governor and a former national committeeman.

Ostracism Threatened

While he said he was heartily in favor of Adams' proposition the candidates who would not support the national ticket be practically read out of the party, Mr. Wilcox stated that the committee of all candidates had been notified for the ballot several weeks ago and there was no legal way to take action against the "bolters" even if the committee wished to do so. He added that, in his opinion a meeting of the committee would be impractical.

Meanwhile a storm of statements from candidates, organization officers, political leaders and others continued to flood political headquarters and newspaper offices.

cepting an invitation to attend a proposed dry conference in Asheville, N. C., sponsored by Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Pointing out that he spoke for himself only, Dr. Mullins said that as things existed at the moment he would vote for Hoover.

He added that he always had stood for "Jeffersonian democracy" ideals but without slavery to party ties. He took several thrusts at Governor Smith, citing especially the latter's record as a wet.

Fire and Water Miracle

Dr. Mullins said that the "wonderful democratic convention" nominated a bone-dry running mate from Arkansas for the opposing wet head of the ticket from the sidewalks of New York. It thus tells the country it will work the greatest miracle of the age; carry fire and water in the same bucket at the same time. The running mate will thus apply the dry torch to the edifice of alcoholic doctrine—but he will be followed at every step by the wet head of the ticket turning on the hose wherever his running mate starts a fire.

The educator referred to Hoover as a "world citizen, the great humanitarian, the great organizer, the man of world vision, the man with expert knowledge of flood control on the Mississippi, the man nominated by the people not the politicians, the man whose personal habits, conscientious convictions and political creed on prohibition are in harmony with his platform and on the right side."

Hoax Theory Sticks
Rumors that the whole affair was a gigantic hoax were circulated in brokers' offices and other concerns interested in dealings of the stock exchanges of London, Paris, Berlin and Brussels. One suggestion was that Lowenstein never left Croyden. Another rumor was that he landed with the plane somewhere between Croyden and Dunkirk, where it was first seen to land, and disappeared, or that he vanished in a fast motor car after landing at Dunkirk.

Newspapers recalled that the mysterious deaths of prominent persons had always been followed by such reports.
