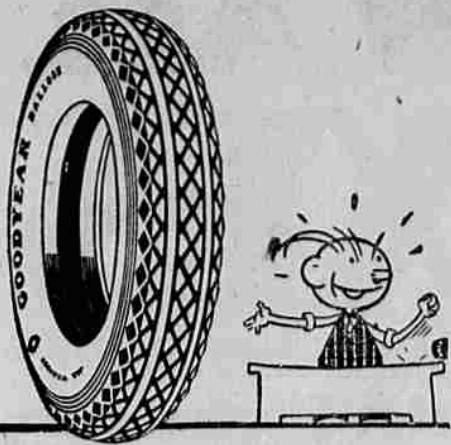

Interests Pear Growers—

Pear growers of the Umpqua Valley will be interested to know that owing to the large quantity of pears still reported unsold in Southern Oregon that a broken price has been established. No. 2 river pears are selling from \$48 to \$42, valley pears from \$42 to \$37 a ton and No. 2 valley pears at half that price. Green shipping of pears from the markets in Southern Oregon will start along the middle of this month or a little later and there will be plenty of pears to ship. The peach crop is estimated as being very heavy this year.
