TWO MORE BANKS PASS TO WEST COAST CORPORATION

PORTLAND, July 10.—Control of the Citizens Bank here, with assets of \$5,000,000, and the Union State Bank, with \$200,000 of assets, has passed to the West Coast Bancorporation, giving this new holding organization possession of five Oregon banks. The agreement was announced late yesterday.

The two institutions involved are located on the East Side of Portland. The Citizens Bank is the fourth largest state chartered bank in Oregon and the third largest in Portland.

Affiliation of the Citizens Bank with the Bancorporation was fore-shadowed last week when control of the bank was acquired by George E. Weatherly, Portland capitalist.

In acquiring control of the two Portland banks, the Bancorporation has raised its banking assets to close to twenty million dollars.

BOYS TURN IN GOOD SCORES AT RIFLE CONTEST

Clifford Collins and Kenneth Pickens won handsome medals yesterday in the rifle shoot conducted at the government range north of town by the Peters Cartridge company. Due to the fact that many of the boys eligible to enter the shoot are attending scout camp at Wolf creek the attendance was not as large as had been hoped for, although there were more than two score of youngsters participating.
