GEO. MASTERSON NOT TO STAND TRIAL FOR DEATH OF MRS. STOY

(Associated Press Special Wire)

PORTLAND, July 11.—George Masterston, who fired the shot that took the life of Mrs. Marjorie Stoy in Masterston's hotel room here two months ago, will not face trial for the killing. The grand jury indictment against the man charging first degree murder was dismissed today at the request of the district attorney, who said every phase of Masterston's story regarding what he said was an accidental shooting was checked and found to conform to police knowledge of the case.

In view of the lack of evidence to show that the shooting was otherwise than accidental the dismissal was suggested.
