GENE TUNNEY NOW AT RIGHT WEIGHT FOR HEENEY BOUT

**Milk Diet Keeps Champion
in Perfect Condition;
Challenger Relies
on Body Punch.**

SPECIALTOR N. Y., July 12.—Gentle doses of milk have kept Gene Tunney from training down too late for the defense of his title against Tom Heenev at the Yankee Stadium July 26. Although the champion still has two weeks of work, he is now just short of the peak of condition. He weighs 197 pounds, and after a hard workout he is five pounds lighter, the exact weight he intends to carry when he faces Heenev.
Tunney restores the five pounds he loses in the ring every day by drinking three pints of milk after each session. He does not intend to let his poundage drop until the eve of the title bout. He has already reached the point where he must reduce his road work. Yesterday he ran only four and one-half miles.
Spectators are charged 50 cents to watch the champion cuff his sparring partners, Harold Mayes and Billy Vidabek. The proceeds go to the Little St. James Catholic church here.

Heenev Takes Light.
FAIR HAVEN, N. J., July 12.—If Tom Heenev falls in his attempt to lift Gene Tunney's heavyweight crown in their battle at the Yankee Stadium July 26, it won't be because he is not used to ring conditions. Tom starts tonight to get used to the conditions he will encounter at the stadium by performing his daily boxing stunt at night under the glare of powerful lights. He does not have an outdoor ring, but the big barn in which "Honest Tom" has pitched his camp is the next best thing.

The Irishman from the Antipodes got a taste of the kind of boxing the champion will offer him in his last daylight workout yesterday when he went one fast round with Armand Emanuel, the young California sensation. Emanuel went around him like the proverbial cooper going around a barrel and made him stop a good many blows. However, the challenger could not display the body attack which he hopes will wear Tunney down in the 15 round encounter, as he desisted by request from landing any hard wallop on the California mid-section. Emanuel made his stop at Fair Haven on the way back to New York from a clam bake and was not in shape to weather a hard body attack even for one round.

Heenev's demonstration against Emanuel indicated that his plan of attack may meet with some success. Although the California succeeded in keeping him at a distance, his blows had little effect on the rugged challenger, while Heenev put his best foot forward at the start and kept on going in that direction until the finish.

Whenever the Cardinals set themselves for a leap into a long lead and a merry laugh at their field, something always seems to happen. It remains a good bet that the eagerly sought mathematical certainty will be reached in both major circuits about mid-September, but this National League race has a way of hanging on.

Fresh from three beatings in Pittsburgh, the runner-up Giants sailed into St. Louis and became the third place club by losing the first game of four to the home club 6 to 4, while the Reds were trimming Brooklyn, 4 to 2.

Cincinnati slid back into third place yesterday by losing to the Robins, 4 to 3.

The Cubs took another from the Braves, 4 to 2, and the Pirates moved out the Phillies, 3 to 1, in a game which Double Day considered serious enough to warrant the use of two pitchers—Brame and Hill.

The American league race continued at the "even pace" into which it settled some ten days ago when the Yankees decided to let along for a while and more strenuous efforts seemed to be necessary. The champions are about even break, losing the first to the Tigers, 4 to 2, as Ken Hults and Ellen Van Gilder outpitched George Piperno and Wiley Moore, and winning the second, 6 to 5.

Waite Hoyt won his twelfth game of the season in the second encounter, but Frank Pennock had to rush to the fore in the third to put down a Detroit spring which all but tied the score.

The Athletics got only an even break against the White Sox, and failed to win, while the Red Sox and the Indians won close games from the Browns and the Senators.

Slugg Harris turned in his best effort of the season, to trim a San Diego crew, 4 to 3, while Brewer's third error enabled Huddell to shade Hackley in a hip-and-tuck duel at Washington 2 to 1.

Drain News

DRAIN, Ore., July 11.—In the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Gaston Lyons, which occurred at the home of her grand daughter, Mrs. Grace Kirkland-Mat, at Springfield on Sunday last at four o'clock in the afternoon, was marked the passing of a woman whose life was a remarkable one in many respects.

The first of these was her age which, at the time of her death, was one hundred and one years, five months and twenty days the last 33 of which she passed in Oregon. She was born in Ohio on January 18, 1827, and at the time of her marriage to Mr. Lyons, in 1854, she removed, with her husband and seven step children, to near Bloomfield, Indiana. To Mr. and Mrs. Lyons were born seven children, one of whom died in infancy and two others when quite small. Her husband died in 1872, his death resulting from an accident. Thus she was left a widow with several children and step children to rear which she did with the courage and fortitude of a true mother. Her son Joseph Lyons, a well known business man in this county from the early thirties until the time of his death two years ago, being in business at different times at Drain and Reedsport and also postmaster of both these places and was also county judge for a term in the county.

Grandma Lyons, as she was familiarly called wherever known, came to Oregon in 1895 being called here on account of the serious illness of her daughter, then Mrs. Grace Lyons-Kirkland, who died within a few days after her arrival leaving three small daughters one, an infant, dying shortly after. Mrs. Lyons then established a home at Drain and reared the other two daughters, Julia and Grace, to womanhood.

Thus Grandma did a noble part in bringing up not only her own children but the step children named and the two grand daughters and also a nephew. Grandma Lyons was a woman of splendid Christian character and was greatly beloved by all who knew her. She united with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church when she was nine years of age and remained to the faith until the time of her death. She was a great reader and kept herself well informed in the current events of former times. She was also well versed in the scriptures and could repeat numerous passages and even chapters from memory.

A few days before her death she asked her attendant to read one of the Psalms for her. The light being dim and the reader misread the words which grandma promptly corrected.

Mrs. Lyons has been quite feeble for several months past and about a week before her death she suffered a slight paralytic stroke which affected her throat particularly making it very difficult to talk or to swallow. Grandma survived all of her children her son Joseph being the last to pass away. Her two daughters, Miss Dame Lyons and Mrs. Grace Kirkland died the latter a few days and the former a few years after she arrived in Oregon and her son, James Lyons, who was a business man at Elkhart for several years, died a few years ago.

She is survived by eleven grand children and nineteen great grand children all of whom reside in Oregon. Those residing in this county are Mrs. Mary Lyons-Beckley and Mrs. Grace Lyons-Beckley and their families, of Elkhart, and Miss Dame Lyons and Mrs. Mary Lyons-Chapman of Reedsport.

The funeral service was held at the Walker Funeral Parlor in Springfield on Tuesday afternoon at four o'clock, and burial was made in the family plot at Springfield. All of the grand children and a number of the great grandchildren were present at the service which was conducted by Rev. Saunders, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Eugene.

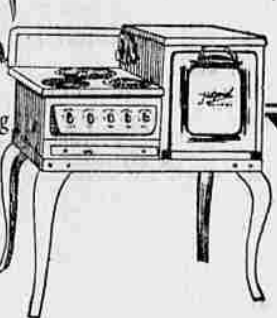
