The Soviet flyer, Chukhovsky had located the men on the ice far to the north of where they had been sought.

Rescuers Once Stranded
MOSCOW, July 12.—Another ironical twist was given to the Noble rescue efforts today with news that the Russian pilot Chukhovsky and four companions were once stranded near North East Land after having discovered the walking party of the Italia and given directions for its rescue.

Prof. Samoilovich, head of the Russian expedition aboard the ice-breaker Krassin, sent a complete report on the discovery of the Malmgren group Tuesday, July 10. The report was as follows:

"A plane piloted by Chukhovsky with Straude, Sholagin, Alekseyev and the movie operator, Blushten, aboard, took off to search for the Vigliani group July 10.

"Circling twice, the plane disappeared in the direction of East Island, which the plane reached without seeing the faintest sign of the Vigliani camp. Proceeding farther and flying low, Chukhovsky suddenly discovered the Malmgren group of three huddled together on a small sharp-edged iceberg. Two of the men stood waving flags while the third lay prostrate.

"Circling five times, Chukhovsky returned, but due to heavy fog did not succeed in reaching the Krassin. Radio contact with Chukhovsky ceased at 8:16 p. m., and it was not until 10:30 a. m. on July 11 that Chukhovsky radioed he had been forced to land a mile or two southwest of Cape Platen, being unable to give the precise location on account of fog.

"The crew has two weeks' supplies of food, weapons and ammunition. Chukhovsky urged the Krassin to make the rescue of the three unfortunates who apparently were in a desperate position."

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Long Without Food

ABOARD RUSSIAN ICE-BREAKER KRASSIN IN ARCTIC, July 12.—The full story of Dr. Malmgren's death and their own bitter suffering was told today aboard the Krassin by the two men who had been saved. For thirty days they had not eaten.

For thirty days had clung to the body of Dr. Malmgren in the vague hope of taking it back to civilization. They had all but resigned themselves to death Tuesday when the Russian plane attacked the Krassin and commanded by Pilot Chukhovsky eight men and directed rescue efforts which ended today.

Setting out from the Noble group on May 15 to bring help, the progress of the three men toward land had been impeded by an injury to Dr. Malmgren's leg which he suffered when the gondola of the Italia crashed.

Savant's Heroism Shown
Unable to move further, the heroic scientist who had given most of his years to study of the secrets of the north, begged them to march on to save their own lives and leave him to his inevitable end, but they would not let him. They felt bound by the closest bonds of comradeship in the desolate frozen waste which surrounded them and they ministered to him until he died.

Even in death they would not desert his body and for thirty days guarded it.

Day after day they spent in the silent horror, their food slowly but steadily diminishing until 13 days ago there was virtually nothing left. In the desolate region where they were of Northeast Land they had just one hope and that was that somehow out of the murky skies might come a rescuing plane.

This dream the men said today, born in infinite pain, was finally fulfilled when Chukhovsky Tuesday emerged from the heavy low hanging clouds like a rescuing angel.

Flier Uses Wireless

Starving as they were and dying inch by inch the plane bore a promise of life, but for the moment this was destined for fulfillment and 36 hours of further suffering were before them. The plane could not land but Chukhovsky, disregarding his own peril from a forced landing on North East Land, directed the Krassin by wireless to the spot where the two men huddled.

All last night the Krassin plunged again and again through the thick mass of ice flows through the miles of sea that separated it from the flying men. At 5 a. m. today the captain on the bridge saw a figure on an ice flow.

Two hours later the ice-breaker drew alongside the group on the ice. One man stood waving faintly a tattered flag and the second lay exhausted on the ice. Beside him was the body of Dr. Malmgren.

Word From Five Others

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, July 12.—The five men of the Italia crew, who are marooned at the scene of the disaster, weak with fever and partially insane, have re-established radio communication with the base ship Clita di Milano. Grave fears for them had prevailed when communications ceased on July 6 because of the weakness of the men and the soft condition of the ice. Return of normal magnetic conditions, however, enabled them to again establish contact with the base ship.

Nitta Behounek, sister of Professor F. Behounek, Czechoslovakian meteorologist, marooned with the Vigliani group, arrived at Kings Bay to await her brother's rescue. Search for Ronald Amundsen and his five companions was continuing today. The French cruiser Strasbourg left Kings Bay to search for the west of Spitzbergen for this party.

MERCHANTS WILL MEET IN SEATTLE

STARTING AUG. 6

With the opening of Seattle's fifteenth annual Pacific Northwest Merchants and Maritime Exposition only a month away, workmen this week began construction of the more than 300 booths that will transform the University of Washington athletic pavilion into an exposition palace for the week.

Preparations for the exposition this year will be more elaborate than ever before, according to J. M. Wilberding, chairman of the general committee, because the pavilion will afford more varied opportunities for exhibitors than any building in the West.

Along with the construction of booths, installation was begun of a special electric wiring system to provide current for spectacular lighting effects that are planned both by the committee and by individual exhibitors. Illuminating gas is being piped across the campus for the special use of certain exhibitors. Construction work was also begun on a large runway, high above the floor of the pavilion, on which the style show will be held before a block of 5,000 seats reserved for the spectators. Preparations were begun to enlarge the area adjacent to the pavilion and the stadium for parking purposes.

The committee is also planning to set up a huge tent outside the pavilion, where noon luncheons will be held during the exposition, under auspices of the various service clubs of the city, including the Kiwanis club, the University Lions club and the Young Men's Business club.

STATE NOW HAS 21 AIRPORTS AND 15 MORE PLANNED

PORTLAND, July 12.—Oregon now has 21 airports and landing fields recognized as such by the department of commerce, according to a recent bulletin of the aeronautics branch of the department, and airports are proposed at 15 additional locations in the state.

California leads all states in the number of airports, according to the department's tabulations, with 113, and Los Angeles with 11 airports is easily the leading city. Texas, where miles of flat country and long distances between cities makes air travel particularly desirable, ranks second among the states with 93 listed airports.

Established Oregon airports listed in the bulletin are as follows: Albany, municipal; Canton, auxiliary; Corvallis, auxiliary; The Dalles, fair grounds, municipal; Eugene, municipal; Forest Grove, commercial; Grants Pass, municipal; Klamath Falls, commercial; Lakeview, municipal; Medford, municipal; Milton, auxiliary; Pendleton, auxiliary; Portland, Rankin airport and Swan Island; Prineville, auxiliary; Roseburg, municipal; St. Helens, auxiliary; Salem, fair grounds, auxiliary, and commercial field; Silverton, municipal.

Among the proposed airports in Oregon mentioned are Astoria, Bandon, Bond, Cottage Grove, Hesper, Hillsboro, Marshfield and Wolf Creek.

Included in the directory are only those fields which are marked and have more or less facilities or which have been marked and reserved as flying fields without facilities.

There are on record, however, more than 4000 other fields in the United States on which landings may be made.

SEVEN ARRESTED FOR MAIL THEFT AT RAILWAY STATION

TORONTO, Ont., July 12.—Two women and five men were held by police today in connection with the \$125,000 robbery of a Canadian National railway mail car at the Union station here the night of June 20.

About \$7,000, approximately one-third of the stolen currency, was recovered. The balance of the loot consisted of securities, the major part of which was found in an abandoned automobile two days after the robbery.

The ringleader and two other members of the band are being sought in the United States.
