## REDDY AND GORE TOLD DECISION ON R. R. COMING SOON

(Associated Press Leased Wire)  
MEDFORD, July 11.—A letter from Louis Levenson of Seattle, Pacific coast manager of the Guggenheim interests, to Dr. J. F. Reddy, holder of an option on the California-Oregon railroad, running west from Grants Pass, and W. H. Gore, local banker, asks them not to be "impatient" about the construction of a railroad from Medford to the Blue Lodge mine, in the Siskiyou, near the California state line.

The letter further states that W. A. Walker of New York City, chairman of the general board of directors of the Guggenheim interests, "will be on the coast shortly, when a decision one way or the other, will be reached regarding the construction of the road." Walker was due to arrive in Medford last Thursday, according to information received here.

The Blue Lodge district is forty miles south of this city, and the mine itself, rich in copper, was acquired by the Guggenheims from the estate of Charles H. Tyens of Boston. The mine was operated 25 years ago, but operations were suspended because of the lack of transportation facilities.

About a year ago Dr. Reddy and Mr. Gore opened negotiations with the Southern Pacific railroad and the Guggenheims for the construction of a railroad to Copper, Cal., and the operation of the mine. The right of way of the abandoned Jacksonville-Medford railroad, was proposed as a nucleus of the railroad.

MEDFORD, July 12.—The first clue to the identity of the 18 year old youth known only as "Young," whose life was crushed out on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, July 1, by the wheels of a Truck driven by Earl Swisher of Klamath Falls, was found today.

The Klamath Falls evening Herald reports that it has received a letter from George W. Young, R. F. D. No. 2, Box 355, Santa Cruz, Cal., making inquiries. The letter says in part:

"I have a son somewhere in that vicinity who works at the mills, and shifts from mill to mill. I feel much concerned, as I do not know where my son is at the present time."

The body was held at the Ashland morgue since death awaiting location of relatives. The youth refused, before he died, to give the address of his parents to the authorities.
