A Doctor Urges a Back-to-Farm Movement for Working Women

It is about time to start a "back to the farm" movement for nervous factory workers and other women and girls who find the city too great a strain, in the opinion of Dr. Mary Hutton, New York physician and feminist, whose work as a specialist for women is known from coast to coast.

"People talk about the loneliness, isolation and hard work confronting the farm woman," Dr. Hutton said. "What about the city's loneliness? The poor girl is thrown in contact with luxury, is under continuous temptation to crash the gate; she is a beggar at the feast of life.

"The drudgery and loneliness of farm life is over-sold by pessimistic folks. Automobiles, motor houses, radio, telephone, and the labor saving devices lighten the day's work and give entertainment for leisure.

"From my experience with working women and girls in by cities, I believe that everything should be done to discourage poor country girls from seeking fame and fortune in the city. And conversely, that city girls should have the advantages of the country pointed out to them."

TWO CALIFORNIA FORESTS ABLAZE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—Two forest fires in California were reported to the forest service today. In the Sequoia national forest what is known as the Onyx fire is burning along the south fork of Fern river. Two thousand acres of brush land have been burned and the 80 men on the fire expect to control it today.

Fire fighters had to pack in six miles to get to the fire. In the Lassen national forest near Yellow Jacket 3,000 acres of timber and brush have been burned over. The fire centers along Mill creek canyon and is 15 miles south of Lyonsville which is east of Red Bluff.

Eighty-five men have been working on this fire and 40 other men were ordered to the blaze today.

LIVESTOCK COMMISSION LAW UNCONSTITUTIONAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire) OMAHA, Neb., July 14.—Special Master in Chancery B. H. Dunham, today declared the packers and stock yards act of congress of 1921 unconstitutional.

The act vested in the secretary of agriculture power to fix and determine commissions chargeable by livestock commission firms at the various markets of the country.

The finding was in a case brought originally by three Omaha commission firms against the secretary of agriculture, attorney general and the United States district attorney. Eighty-nine additional plaintiffs later joined the suit.
