The state printer circuits are operated direct from the day and night offices of the Associated Press bureau in the Portland Telegram and Oregonian buildings, respectively.

The Portland newspapers are served by the Oregon state circuit on incoming Oregon news, and contribute Portland news to the circuits.

World and national news received in Portland by the high speed teletype and Morse circuits goes simultaneously to the two Portland papers and to the Portland bureau for distribution to the papers on the state circuits.

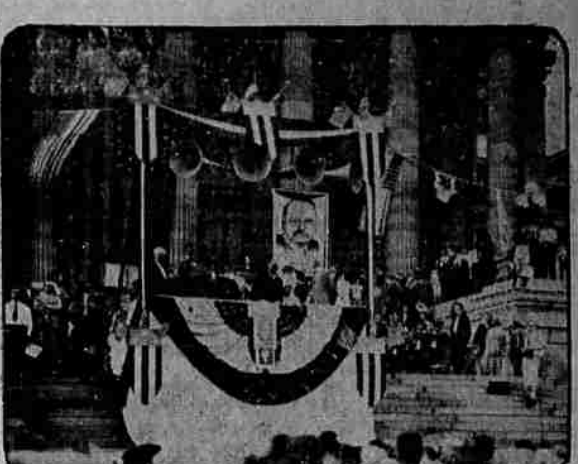
