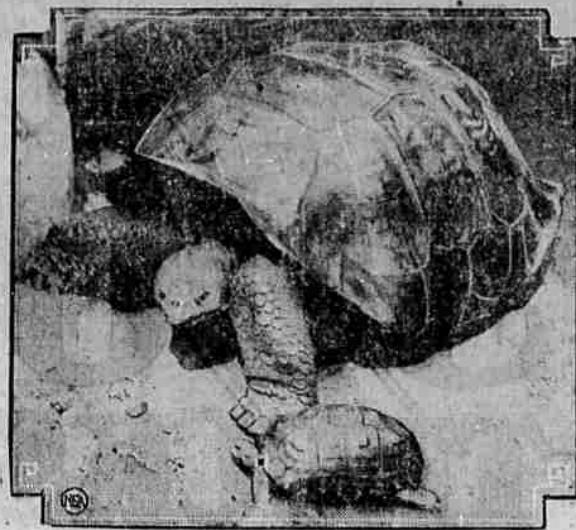


Yes Life's a Great Old Shell Game

BALL SCORES IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Thanks to Del Bissanette and the Brooklyn Dodgers, the National league pennant race has not yet developed into a runaway affair with the St. Louis Cardinals doing the running and the rest of the field panting a city block or two to the rear.

The Dodgers in general and M'sieu Bissanette in particular contrived to upset the league leaders yesterday for the second successive day, 3 to 1, and the New York Giants, defeating Cincinnati, again moved to within four and a half games of the Cards.

Freddy Fitzsimmons won his own game at Cincinnati when he doubled in the eighth inning, scoring Mel Ott with the run that gave the Giants a 2-1 victory over the Reds. Fitz and Red Lucas tangled in a fight hurling duel in which each team made only six hits.

Taking over the Phils 6 to 3 for

their sixth straight victory the Chicago Cubs clung to their third place post two percentage points back of the Giants. Bush was hit hard but lasted until the ninth. With two out and two runs in, Percy Jones entered the box to retire the side.

Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig made it 53 home runs for the year as the New York Yankees captured both ends of a double header with the Cleveland Indians, 3 to 9 and 6 to 4. Herb Pennock ran his string of consecutive scoreless innings to 26 in the first encounter and his single in the sixth drove in two of the three Yankee runs. Ruth hammered out his 34th homer of the year in the first inning of the nightcap and Gehrig got his 19th in the fifth. Ruth now stands 15 games, 13 days and four home runs ahead of his 1927 record.

The St. Louis Browns found Washington a stubborn foe but the Senators finally yielded in the 12th inning when the Browns pushed across two runs and won, 6 to 4.

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SPAIN SUPPRESSES
PLOT BY JAILING
SEVERAL SUSPECTS

QUERTHARY, France, July 16.—Border police officials say that numerous arrests have been made throughout Spain to suppress what is termed a widespread plot against the government.

All frontiers were under strict guard today. Passengers on international trains were being made subject to searching investigations. Arrests were stated to have been made in Madrid, Barcelona, Saragossa, Oviedo and Orense.

It was reported that a number of workmen engaged in reconstructing the Theater Royal, which is near the royal palace in Madrid, had been detained for police investigation. All syndicalists were being watched closely.

Censorship has been applied to all newspapers in Spain and none of them was permitted to publish anything about the affair.

MADRID, July 16.—La Nacion, official organ of the government, says that rumors that the plot against the government has developed into a movement of really grave proportions are untrue.

The paper asserts the truth is that a group of "impenitent, professional revolutionists" tried to foment an anti-government movement, "seeking to justify their action by many things." They took advantage of a few dozen of ill-used persons and at the same time made use of the absence of King Alfonso in England and that Premier Primo di Rivera had to go to the Canfranc pass for the opening of the international railway.

TREE PLANTED BY
PIONEER 94 YEARS
AGO MAKES VENEER

An interesting account of a walnut tree that was recently cut near Oakland, is contained in the current issue of The Timberman. The article is as follows:

The Napoleon Walnut
When caravans of covered wagons braved desert perils and Indian ambush to settle in the fertile valleys of Oregon, there was a Texan named Napoleon Rice, who carried with him a walnut tree which has since grown to enormous size. This tree, known as the Napoleon walnut, has been recently cut by the Perrod Walnut and Veneer company, producing approximately 4500 feet of lumber, a whole carload.

Planted in 1835 on the banks of the Calapooia river, near the site of the town of Oakland, the tree, protected from blighting winds, watered with frequent showers and invigorated by warm sunshine, grew ever larger as the years rolled by and when finally cut to provide furniture of distinction for home loving Americans, it showed by its ring growth a life of 94 years.

With a length of 9 1/2 feet, the butt log weighed 8 1/2 tons. In addition to the butt log, the tree produced five other large logs and four or five short chunks. At the top of the butt long the crotch showed one fork with a diameter of 48 inches, the other with a diameter of 35 inches. Although nearly a century old when cut, this venerable walnut was found to be perfectly sound and without holiness of decayed parts.

FAMOUS INDIAN BELTS,
HIDDEN OVER CENTURY,
TO BE SHOWN AGAIN

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., July 14.—Three wampum belts, the most prized possession of the Algonquin Indians of Canada, will be exhibited to the white man today, for the first time in more than a century. The belts were brought from northern Quebec by Chief Michel Cote, whose Indian name is "Listen," and five companions, who arrived here yesterday to participate in the celebration of the return to the Indians by Unit-

ed States courts their treaty rights to cross the international border at will, without regard for United States immigration regulations.

For 125 years the wampum belts have been carefully hidden in the northern wilds of Quebec. They were taken to the far north when the Algonquins feared the whites would make an effort to seize them.

"No one knows how old these wampum belts are," said Chief Cote. "They are thousands of years old, but how many no man can tell."

POLITICS DISCLAIMED AT
PICNIC ST. LOUIS SMITHS

ST. LOUIS, July 16.—The question "What's in a name?" took on added significance today with the picnic of "the Smith Association of the World," an organization of persons whose names are spelled "Smith."

The organization was formed less than a month ago, but its officials said they expected at least 2,000 Smiths to appear at the picnic park before the day was over. The association was formed for the purpose of promoting friendship among the Smith families and

for charitable purposes.
Frank R. Smith, its president, said the association had no political aims and would endorse no presidential candidates whether they bore the name of Smith or not.
"If any of our Smiths intend wearing brown derbies to the picnic it will be a personal matter," he said.
A host of 100 Smiths was organized for the picnic.

4 HUNGARIAN OFFICERS
