## FOUR YOUTHS WHO SLEW GIRL USHER PLEAD GUILTY

CHICAGO, July 17.—The state's futile search for a jury willing to send four boys to death for the murder of Pearl Eggleston, during a motion picture show holdup, was ended abruptly today when defense counsel entered pleas of guilty in behalf of the youths. The move surprised the prosecutors who had examined more than 200 veniremen without approving a single juror in the eight days of trial. The majority of veniremen had expressed reluctance to vote the death penalty. Judge Frank Comerford asked each defendant if he understood the purport of the guilty plea and that sentences of death or life imprisonment might be imposed. The boys, Stanley Durmaj, 20; Stanley Thomas, 19; Albert Maa, 21, and John Tulacz, 22, agreed. The state announced that it would insist on the electric chair for the boys. The trial will be resumed Thursday.
