MEXICO CITY, July 18.—Vows to avenge the death of General Alvaro Obregon were made yesterday by a room full of the most prominent adherents of his political fortunes.

When the body of the president-elect still bleeding, was borne into his residence, these men swore never to cease their fight for the principles of the Mexican revolution and "against the enemies of the people who caused the murder of our leader."

Aurelio Manrique, a member of congress, mounted a chair as the corpse was brought into the room. In a voice trembling with emotion he proposed the vow and all present pledged themselves to it with shouts of "Viva Obregon."

BAND CONCERT TO BE GIVEN AT NEW LOCATION THURS.

The Roseburg Municipal band in giving its regular weekly concert, will play at the library park Thursday evening, instead of at the court house grounds as formerly. The bandstand is being made ready to move today, and will require only a few hours to be transferred to the new site, after it is once started, as it is being arranged so that it can be transferred quickly.

It was necessary to move the bandstand because of the court house construction, and as the city rest park at the library grounds was deemed to be the most suitable place, the stand is being moved there and will be placed at the north end of the lot. It is believed that the new location will be a much finer place for these concerts. The band will also be canopied by trees which will serve to blend the sound much better than in the former location.

FINANCIAL NEWS

National Biscuit company reports second quarter net profit of \$1,559,941, bringing net profit for the half year to \$3,355,072. This compares with \$4,324,317 in the second quarter of 1927 and \$3,059,985 for the previous corresponding half year.
June sales of twenty-two chain store companies tabulated by Merrill Lynch & Co. show an increase of 20.4 per cent over June last year, \$105,709,334 against \$87,741,885. All showed gains except the Childs company, restaurants.
The tool industry, taken as a whole, has just passed through an exceptionally good half year. Manufacturers of machinery enter the summer period with considerable optimism, the American Machinist reports. With sustained activity in the automotive industry, a high rate of industrial construction and increased expenditure by the railroads, the outlook for the third quarter is regarded as favorable.

HOPE TO MAKE 'HOME BOY' OF LAD WHO RAN OFF 50 TIMES

SEATTLE, Wash., July 18.—Surgical science is going to try to cure a 9-year-old Seattle boy of the "runaway complex."

He is Byron Louth, and allensists say he is above the average in intelligence. But he has run away from home 50 times in the past few months. Sometimes he starts out afoot; sometimes he pedals away on any kid's bicycle that comes handy.

"I don't want to run away," Byron says, "but something comes over me and I just can't help it. If the doctors can stop me, I'm for them. I want to stay home."

Around his neck Byron wears a tag. It says: "This boy runs away; please send him home to his mother." Officers all over the north-west know him; sometimes he gets hundreds of miles away before he is caught.

Examination of the child by alienists here shows that one side of his brain is over-developed; the other, under-developed. It is hoped that a surgical operation may correct this, allow the weak side of the brain to develop and so make Byron a "home boy."

"Veteran" officers for miles around Seattle say that "it would take half a dozen deputy sheriffs to keep the kid in his own back yard when he wants to go."
