Ideas on Salmon—
Salmon jerking the way the Indians used to do, minus the dirt, is an industry which Thomas A. Richmond of Gardiner is working on. The salmon are smoked within a few hours after they are taken from the waters of the Umpqua or from the ocean outside Winchester bay. The process of jerking salmon is practically identical with that used in jerking deer meat and consists of plenty of salt, brown sugar and the smoke from alder wood. Mr. Richmond, who is in Portland, says that the trollers are ruining the salmon industry on the coast, for the trollers are catching the immature fish. There appears to be an way of curing this method of fishing, notwithstanding that it is threatening the future supply of salmon—Portland Oregonian.
