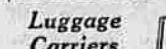

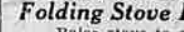

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FARM AID ADVICE OFFERED HOOVER IS CONFLICTING

Presidential Nominee May Defer Aid Plan Until After Survey of Conditions.

ABOARD HOOVER TRAIN. CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 18.—Friends who have conferred with Hoover during his westward journey to California have gained the impression that the republican presidential nominee does not intend to advance any specific plan of farm relief in his acceptance speech at Palo Alto next month. These same friends declare, however, that Mr. Hoover is thoroughly alive to the fact that the condition of agriculture presents a problem which calls for solution, and that he will pledge himself to make a thorough going survey of the whole situation, and to dedicate his best efforts to the formulation of a practical plan of aid.

Details of a specific plan very likely will be left for further study with the possibility that as the campaign progresses proposals will be outlined, with the first of these probably touched upon when the nominee speaks at his old home at West Branch, Ia., late next month.

As he has traveled across the continent during the past five days, Mr. Hoover has received somewhat conflicting views from leaders in the farm movement as to just what the situation in the corn belt really is as it bears upon his own political fortunes and those of his party.

Nowhere was this more pronounced than in Nebraska, where Gov. Aam McMillen insisted that only the equalization fee, or its equivalent, would satisfy the farmers and keep them in the republican ranks in November. Charles A. McCloud, republican national committeeman for that state, and other political leaders declared that the equalization fee principle was out and that there was no doubt about Nebraska giving a substantial majority for the Hoover-Curtis ticket.

NEW LOCATION FOR BAND STAND IS IMPROVEMENT

The change in the location of the bandstand from the court house property to the city library park was declared by members of the band and by a great many music lovers to be a decided improvement. The bandstand instead of being placed at the north end of the lot, as had been planned, was set on the west side, so that it faces Rose street, thereby adding a great deal in the way of appearance and providing better sound.

In the new location the band music was much more enjoyable. The overhanging trees, forming a natural canopy, mellowed and softened the music, enabling the band to give much better interpretations of difficult passages. The local band is playing music of a very high class, considerably above that of the usual city band. Much, therefore, depends upon the acoustics and in the former location, where many echoes came from nearby buildings, much of the finer quality of the music was lost. In the new location, however, the strains are blended perfectly and the musicians found it much easier to play.

Director Dale Strange this morning expressed himself as being well pleased with the change and is already planning of several innovations for future programs, made possible through the new setting.

BIRTH CONTROL PROGRESS PRAISED BY LADY ASTOR

PLYMOUTH, England, July 19.—Lady Astor, speaking on the question of maternal mortality at the royal sanitary conference, said that when she thought of what women of the past had to endure she "rejoiced that men have begun to see reason and that they will now reckon with us."

Lady Astor expressed hope that the government committee on maternal mortality would deal fearlessly with the question of birth control and would give a considered judgment regarding how far ignorance and quick remedies were responsible for an unnecessarily high death rate. She said she did not believe that the matter could be put aside by making it a religious one and felt that the state must legislate impartially.

Ed Morris registered his 13th pitching victory of the year as the Boston Red Sox evened the series with Cleveland, 3 to 2 in 11 innings.

Over in the National league the St. Louis pace-setting Cardinals added more woe to the unlucky Phillies. The Cards just barely

nosed out a 6-to-5 verdict that marked the Phils' eleventh straight defeat.

Next time the Brooklyn Dodgers snapped a nine-game winning streak rolled up by the defending league champions, the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3 to 0. Doug McWeeny had a slight edge on the young pirate southpaw, Fred Fussell, the Dodger hurler accounting for the last two of his team's runs in the ninth when he drove two men with a single.

Boston finally managed to end a nine-game losing streak by pounding out a 9-to-4 verdict over the Cincinnati Reds. The Reds called upon four pitchers to stem the tide but it was to no avail.

Against the same White Sox yesterday Herb Pennock was unsteady most of the way but the Babe pulled him through to a 6-to-4 victory by propelling his 37th and 38th circuit clouts into the stands, each time with Earle Combs on base.

These two Ruthian drives put the "big barn" twenty-seven games, twenty-nine days and eight home runs ahead of his 1927 schedule when he slammed 60 for a new record.

The Athletics shaved half a game off the champions' lead by turning back the St. Louis Browns in both ends of a double bill, 2 to 0 and 4 to 3, the latter in 11 innings.

Owen Carroll pitched the Detroit Tigers to a 9-to-3 triumph over the Washington Senators in the first game of a double header but Bill Gaston reversed matters in the second, the Senators walking off with an easy 7-to-2 win.
