MEXICAN POLICE SEEK SUSPECTED AIDES OF KILLER

Attempting to Put Blame for Assassination of General Obregon on Clergy.

(Associated Press Local Wire) MEXICO CITY, July 20.—Police and military authorities of Mexico were restrained by the district court today from taking action against Jose de Leon Torral, slayer of General Alvaro Obregon, for 72 hours.

This action came simultaneously with an official announcement that the youthful art student would be given a public trial. The authorities continued, in giving out what little information was made available, to accept the charge made by General Antonio Idoia Zertuche, new chief of police, "that responsibility for the crime lies with the Catholic clergy."

The police say they have in their possession printed leaflets secretly distributed recently among some Catholics which state that the days of Obregon and President Calles are numbered. They assert that the leaflets contain this exhortation:

"Every dog has his day and the day of Obregon draws near."

Catholics Arrested.

The police also are holding for investigation in connection with the assassination a number of Catholics who have been arrested recently on charges of violating the religious law by participating in mass in schools or private residences. The prisoners include 15 out of 20 nuns in Villa Guadalupe where the shrine of Our Lady Guadalupe, patron saint of Mexico, is situated.

The family of the slayer, consisting of the father and mother, the slayer's wife, Tazmaria Del Campo de Leon, and about six relatives were still held at police headquarters.

Priest is Killer's Kin.

Newspapers, conducting their own investigations of Torral's past print a number of assertions respecting associates in Guadalajara. Excelsior states that a brother of the slayer is a priest who is presumed to be in hiding. The despatches add that the killer was a close friend of the Priest Projearez who was among the four men executed after the attempt to bomb General Obregon last November.

Military authorities today removed from the grave of Projearez a placard placed there during the night and bearing the legend: "You are avenged."

ELLEN TERRY OF STAGE FAME IS DEAD AT EIGHTY

(Continued from page 1.) the stage. She was married three times.

She was personally acquainted with many of the great personages of the Victorian era, including Disraeli, Gladstone and Tennyson.

Autograph hunters pursued her everywhere and she finally capitulated by charging a shilling for each autograph and turning the money into maintenance of a cot in the children's hospital.

Honored by Royalty. Queen Victoria witnessed Miss Terry's stage debut at the age of eight and thought so much of her histrionic ability that years later she "commanded" her presence at Sandringham Palace where she performed for the queen and the future King Edward VII.

King George V created Miss Terry a Dame Grand Cross of the British Empire in 1925. St. Andrews University honored her with the degree of doctor of laws.

Miss Terry's outstanding roles were those of Portia and Ophelia although she made remarkable portrayals of Juliet, Beatrice, Desdemona, Margaret, Lady Macbeth, Rosamund, Calanthe, Imogen, Olivia and Madam Sans-Gene. Her great triumph came in 1875 as Portia under the management of the Bancrofts and her fame was firmly founded three years later when she played Ophelia to the Hamlet of Sir Henry Irving.

Her last stage appearance was in the aid of charity when on January 18, 1923, she spoke the prologue to "The York Nativity Play" at the League of Arts Guildhouse, London. After that she virtually retired to her home at Burlingame Mansions, London, where she spent the declining years of her life surrounded by her friends and loved ones and basking in the glory of her dramatic honors.

Miss Terry was born February 27, 1843, at Coventry in Warwickshire, almost in the heart of the Shakespeare country she was destined to represent so well.

operated until 12 or 15 years ago. Mr. Micelli then became interested in the banking business and became president of the First State and Savings bank, in which capacity he continued for a number of years, until the condition of his health forced him to conserve his physical energies, and he retired from the active banking business.

He also devoted his attention to the activities of the Roseburg Ice company, in which he had been a stockholder, director and officer for a number of years, and aided in enlarging the capacity of the plant and extending the business.

During late months the condition of his health has prevented his active participation in any form of business or labor.

He was married in Roseburg to Miss Grace Preschern, a member of a well known, Douglas county family, and to the union was born two sons, Victor J., and Albert H., who with Mrs. Micelli still survive and make their homes in this city.

Mr. Micelli gave a number of years of service to the city of Roseburg, serving in a most able and efficient manner in several responsible positions.

Councilman Six Years. He was elected councilman in 1906 and was made chairman of the street committee, serving for three terms in that capacity, during which time the first pavement was laid in this city, the street and sewer program adopted. Mr. Micelli was greatly interested in this work and took a great deal of time from his business to actively engage in sponsoring and supervising these improvements.

He was also very active in fraternal circles, being a member of the Elks lodge, the L. O. O. F. lodge and also the Knights of Pythias. He was very interested in the work of the Odd Fellows lodge and served in all of the chairs, entering the grand lodge in 1892 and serving as grand master in 1903-1904. He was also connected with the Patriarchs Militant, Pebebah lodge and Muzcovites. He was representative to the grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias for three terms and was delegate to the first state convention ever held by that order.

The funeral services will be held Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking Chapel. The services will be conducted by the Elks and Odd Fellows lodges. Interment will be in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.
