G. O. P. CAMPAIGN FUND IS SET AT THREE MILLION

National Party Treasurer
Nutt Says Battle This
Year Harder Than
4 Years Ago.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, July 23.—J. R. Nutt, treasurer of the republican national committee, is making plans for raising at least \$3,000,000 to meet the cost of the Hoover presidential campaign.

This figure, he believes, cannot be considered excessive. In estimating the amount to be spent, he referred to the fact that the Coolidge campaign of four years ago, entailed disbursements of that amount, and remarked: "We have a harder fight on our hands this time."

The appointment of Jeremiah Milbank, of New York, as Eastern treasurer was announced.

No limit is to be placed upon the size of gifts to the campaign chest. All contributions will be on public record and each subscriber will be given a receipt for his contribution.

Nevada Regarded Safe.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—While the special train was in Nevada yesterday, Secretary Herbert Hoover received encouraging reports from republican leaders of Nevada and nearby states. These were given by Governor Hazen of Nevada and N. H. Getchell, of Battle Mountain, wealthy miner and banker and republican state chairman for Nevada, and others.

Getchell declared there was no doubt about Nevada voting republican in November.

"This is the first time in history that we have had the opportunity and the privilege of voting for a western man for the presidency," he said. "We know that Mr. Hoover knows our problems because he has slept under the sage brush like the rest of us. He is a westerner and has our point of view."

Meyers chose to fight instead of wrestle. He struck Pajello twice and hit Referee Thiry in a third attempt. The match was stopped, but Pajello tried to force Meyers to the mat. A thousand fans crowded around the mat as fists flew between the principals.

Commissioner Paul Prah of the Illinois State Boxing commission, announced Meyers' purse would be withheld, and the ex-middleweight champion would be suspended for a year.

THREE SISTERS CAMP SPOTS EYED FOR BOY SCOUTS

O. L. Johnson, president of the Douglas-Cos council, Boy Scouts of America, and E. A. Britton, the scout executive have just returned from a visit to the Three Sisters area. This trip was made for the purpose of inspecting camp sites to be used by the Boy Scouts who are going on the Three Sisters trip, beginning next Saturday, July 28.

Leaving here Wednesday morning, they drove up by way of the McKenzie Pass stopping along the way to look over various spots where the boys may stop while on their trip. Wednesday evening they stopped at Big Spring, west of Bend, on the Century drive. Thursday morning they drove down to Elk Lake and then back to Devils Lake, thence to Wickiup plane, where they left the car and climbed the South Sister mountain from the south. They reached the top at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, but did not get a good view of the country, due to a hovering cloud. However, they did get a good view from a point about fifty yards below the top. They went down on the north side of the mountain by way of the Skyline and Devils Lake trail to the car, which they reached at 9 p. m. They drove home yesterday by way of the Willamette Pass road.

They have decided that the boys will not use the Willamette Pass road because of many steep grades and sharp curves, but instead will take the McKenzie highway, which is wide and has an even grade.

The boys on this camp do their own cooking and if shelter is needed they will build lean-tos or no tents are being taken along. There is lots of snow there and many good slides will be enjoyed.
