ABANDONED ROUTE IN COTTAGE GROVE DISTRICT TO BE REBUILT

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 23.—The so-called Shoestring road, abandoned stage road of pioneer days, is being put in condition for travel. While the road is but six miles long, it was an important link in the main road to California in days before the railroad came. It was used intermittently until the paved highway was built through Pass creek canyon and since then it has been so neglected that rains have destroyed the grade.

The road connects at London with the coast fork road from Cottage Grove and across the mountain connecting with roads to Drizin and Yoncalla. Residents of the Shoestring valley would be saved 15 or 20 miles in getting to Cottage Grove. The main toll lines of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company still follow this old road.

SANDINO'S BAND

SLOWLY POCKETED

BY U. S. MARINES

(Associated Press Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 23.—The marines in Nicaragua hope to reach the end of their campaign against General Sandino within a few months.

Latest reports received at the navy department say that the insurgent leader and his band are practically surrounded by the American forces in northern Nicaragua between the Coco and Belaya rivers. Surrender or flight to Honduras are looked for within a comparatively short time.

A campaign of "pocketing" the band is being pursued.

Marine headquarters here estimate the strength of the Sandino band at 150 men and believe that, since the surrender of more than 500 natives within the last two weeks, it is the only insurgent group now in the Nicaraguan interior.

While the marines outnumber Sandino's men, their operations are made extremely difficult and perilous by the character of the terrain. Like Sandino, the marines are cut off by land from their bases of supplies. Airplanes carry their provisions and drop them by parachute, and in some instances the rivers are used.

Dispatches picture Sandino as

fearful for his personal safety and on his guard against treachery among his followers, permitting only those who are known to him to enter his camp. His men know the country well and he has established an elaborate system of outposts to warn him of the movements of the American troops.

REEDSPORT KIWANIS CLUB WILL PLANT RICE IN LAKES

A party of 12 Kiwanis club members were visitors to Lake Tahkenitch, Wednesday, where they planted wild rice to be used as an attraction for wild ducks and geese, says the Port Townsend Courier. The rice was sent to Reedport by the Oregon state game commission and is the start of an attempt to secure the arrival of more ducks and wild fowl on the lakes. The growth of the great wheat fields in the interior and the scarcity of food on the lakes has caused the ducks and other wild fowl to make their way to the southern climate by the interior route.

The party was taken to Gardiner by Arlie Smith and transferred to Marion Locke, who transported the party for a distance of several miles to the forks of the road near the lakes.

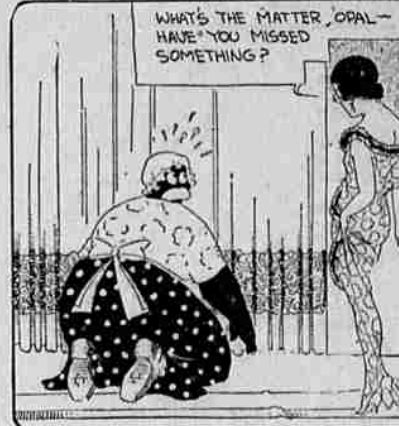
There they were met by Roy Stonecker, host and guide of the party, and taken to the Five Mile creek section, where the rice was planted.
