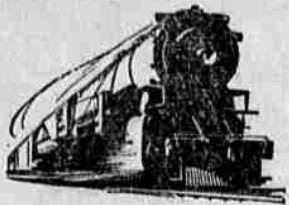
INJUNCTION HALTS BLACK WING OF GEORGIA G. O. P.

HEENEY FEELS SURE HE WILL DEFEAT TUNNEY

Does Not Fear Antagonist
He Regards as Boxer,
Not Slugger.

CONDITION — PERFECT

Expects to Take Beating in
Early Rounds, Then Slow
Up Champion With
Hard Swats.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 24.—Blunt Tom Heenev, unaccustomed to camouflaging his thoughts when interviewed, plod him with questions, frankly admitted today that he is in the best condition of his fighting career. Ready and eager to give Gene Tunney the battle of his life when they meet in the Yankee stadium Thursday night for the world's heavyweight championship.

The old hard rock, whose rugged features are furrowed with lines that reveal the near approach of the peak of condition, said he had no set plans about his task of knocking Tunney off the heavyweight throne. Getting the feel of Tunney is a paramount question of his battle strategy.

"I have some ideas, of course," the challenger said, "but they probably won't amount to much for the first three or four rounds until I get the feel of Tunney."

"One of my ideas is that he is not going to hit me very often with any one punch. Anybody can hit a few times with any kind of a blow, but nobody can keep it up."

"Best me, if I don't show you Americans that I'm no sucker for a felt hook or a right cross. If Tunney believes he can wear me down with rights to the head I am going to discourage him."

Feels Sure of Victory
Heenev is genuinely confident of his ability to beat Tunney and bases his conclusion in one thought that has secretly convinced him that he will become world's heavyweight champion. That thought is, he believes boxers are easier for him than fighters, and Tunney is a boxer rather than a fighter.

"Fighters, or what I mean by fighters, are more dangerous than boxers not only for me but for most any one in the boxing game. A boxer will hit you more often than a fighter, but when you do hit a boxer he loses a lot of his boxing and you get a chance to put in a sock that will bring him down to your speed. Fighters, that is real fighters, will keep bagging away even after you do wallop them a good one. A boxer is liable to run."

Gibbons Sees Chance
Heenev cherishes a letter received from Tom Gibbons, once a contender for the heavyweight title, the only man besides Tunney to face Dempsey as champion, and be on his feet at the finish. It will be no surprise to Gibbons if Heenev defeats Tunney. He worked with the New Zealander while in London four years ago preparing for a fight with Jack Broomfield.

"Believe me you have a good chance," Gibbons wrote, "I'm not kidding you. You won't find Tunney the greatest champion of all time. I know that when it is all over, Mr. Tunney will know that he has been in a fight."

Gibbons advised the invader not to be "what the boys around the corner call a 'good fellow' because when you are broke they will be the first to turn you down."

Flynn's Opinion
Leo P. Flynn, who trained Jack Dempsey for his second battle with Tunney, takes issue with the Massachusetts matter over Heenev's prospects. Dempsey gave him an even chance, while Flynn, a veteran handler of boxers, unhesitatingly picks Tunney to win on points.

"Heenev, to me, has no more assets than an honest village blacksmith," Flynn said. "Tunney will lick him sure, but may not knock him out."

A TRIBUTE TO THE MEM- ORY OF OSCAR RODLEY

DETROIT, July 24.—Major Thomas G. Lanpher has tendered his resignation from the army to the secretary of war. It became known here today. It is understood major Lanpher will become associated with Col. Charles A. Lindbergh in the newly organized trans-continental air transport.

The resignation, it is understood, becomes effective some time next month. He had in large measure, those qualities of optimism, desire to do his work well, and ability to get along with people under all circumstances—all these, so important toward making life worth living, a success.

Like all our high-minded, energetic young Americans of today there ruled in him a spirit of adventure, of daring, of challenge to fate. His friends well remember his adventure, in bravado, with poison oak and its consequences; his serious experience and ugly wound from a double-bitted axe; his frequent escapes from drowning. But such a spirit of taking chances is what makes our heroes of the air, the earth, and the sea—is it not? It did that to Lindbergh. Yet, no doubt this dashing recklessness caused Oscar's death. Adventurous souls often meet an early death.

Let his young friends not forget his constant striving to gain that education so necessary now-a-days for making a living and for service to others and to our country. He had his struggles and setbacks to secure a high school education and also to finish his short course in Forestry at Idaho State College. But this struggling with adversity did not deter him.

From his grave goes forth this message to all young people who knew him: It is high ideals, cheerful courage, obedience to duty, and service to your fellow-men, whatever may be the place or profession, that counts. These qualities will win for you a life that is a real success—not, perhaps, financially; yet, in the other and better way, it is lives such as this that makes the foundation and framework of our country solid and durable, and causes it to become worthy of our highest patriotism.

To the young men and women who look questioningly ahead, from the threshold of life: Let them ponder the lesson of Oscar Rodley's short life. It is: "This is the way; walk ye in it."

It seems so pitiful and pathetic to us mortals that one so young and fresh and eager for life, and its adventures should be cut off so suddenly. But it is more than likely that our view of the matter is short-sighted. In that case we may sincerely say that Oscar fell in death and left his unfinished work on earth—for the house not made with hands—yet eternal in the heavens. "And, coming out of the river all the hosts came out to meet him and greet him."

MOSES BELIEVES HOOVER WILL EVEN CARRY NEW YORK

NEW YORK, July 23.—Expecting the most hotly contested presidential campaign since 1892, Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire, Eastern director of the republican campaign, was here today for a conference with National Chairman Herbert Work and the national committeemen from the Eastern states.

"This campaign is going to be the most warmly contested of any since 1892," Senator Moses said. "The democrats are going to have more money this year than they have had since 1892. But of the outcome there is no doubt. Hoover is bound to win."

Moses added that he was not worried over the presidential election but that he was "concerned" about the election of a senator from Massachusetts. He expressed confidence that Hoover would carry New York state.

ANTI-OBREGON OFFICIALS QUIT JOBS IN MEXICO

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
MEXICO CITY, July 23.—Resignation of Luis Morones, secretary of labor, whose life has been in danger since the assassination of General Alvaro Obregon, today was believed to have lessened the general feeling of tension.

Agrarian leaders naming Morones as one of the "psychological authors" of the crime had asserted that unless he withdrew from the government there would be civil warfare.

The central committee of the regional federation of labor instructed Morones and two other labor leaders, Celestino Gasca, chief of ordinance supplies, and Eduardo Mendon, chief of the government printing shops, to resign. President Calles promptly accepted their withdrawal from his government.

Colonel Riccardo Topete, acknowledged leader of the Obregon national party, said that there was now little likelihood of disturbance.

Either President Calles or Aaron Scaenz, governor of Nueva Leon, will be named by congress provisional president of Mexico for two years, Colonel Topete said.

COLONEL BALLOU, WORLD WAR HERO, IS DEAD AT 66

SPokane, Wash., July 24.—Colonel Charles Clarendon Ballou, hero of many battles and commander of the 52nd American Division during the World War in France, died at his home here yesterday of heart failure at the age of 66.

Colonel Ballou, who was a major-general during the conflict, retired from active service two years ago. He had been commander of Fort George Wright here. His World War service earned him the cross and ribbon of an officer of the Legion of Honor.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters, Bertha and Alice, and one son, Lieut. Charles Ballou, stationed in Louisiana.

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BANCITALY SHOWS GAIN IN PROFITS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—Profits of Bancitaly corporation from Jan. 20 to July 10, this year, set a new record and exceeded the profits in any previous full year said a statement published today by L. M. Glanville, executive vice president of the institution.

The current statement of Bancitaly's condition showed total assets of \$294,943,350. Cash in banks and call loans at the close of business July 19 amount to \$20,455,751 and bills and accounts receivable \$12,293,695. Securities and investments conservatively amounted to \$254,972,807. Investments in business properties were \$7,777,353, less mortgages of \$770,031. Investments in subsidiaries were \$184,304.

The statement said normal earnings of the corporation had been \$35,233,553, adding that if the same level of earnings was maintained throughout the year, Bancitaly would earn over \$12 a share, or more than 11 per cent on the present value of the stock. These earnings were said to be exclusive of any profits from the transaction involving the Bank of America, Bank and East River National Bank, and Commercial Exchange Bank of New York.

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
