RAILROADS ABUSE PRIVATE CAR RIGHT, OFFICIAL ASSERTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 26.—The Interstate Commerce commission was told today by Commissioner McManamy that abuses in the use of railroad-owned private passenger cars were common, and expensive. He suggested a series of new regulations to limit railroad expenditures in this field.

McManamy, in a report advised the commission that a study of private car movements during the last three years had disclosed wasteful and unlawful movements on a large scale. He recommended that the commission hereafter

could one railroad from moving a private car for another road except at regular changes, thus abolishing the system by which such cars are moved from when off their home lines.

The report declared that the practice of transporting persons other than railroad employees in private passenger cars at the same rates charged passengers provided only with ordinary coach accommodations constituted an unjust discrimination and should likewise be prohibited.

A general practice of the use of railroad private cars by the wives, daughters and friends of railroad officials for the transportation of parties to and from pleasure resorts was described by McManamy. Certain railroads were cited as being particularly engaged in such practice. In a number of cases the parties carried on private cars included officers of industrial corporations and their families, indicating a use of the free transportation in influence shipments. One private car identified as "owned by the vice-

president of one of the Eastern carriers," was found to have been traveling steadily for three years to all points in the United States.

EDWIN WEAVER AND PARTY BACK FROM INTERESTING TRIP

Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Weaver, accompanied by their son, George D. Weaver, and their grandson, Alton E. Alsbaugh, have returned from an extended auto trip into Ohio, making the trip over a period of two months. The 12-year-old grandson maintained a daily log of the trip and has written the following interesting account of the visit to the east:

With Geo. D. Weaver as chauffeur and Alton E. Alsbaugh as traveling companion, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Weaver left Myrtle Creek May 20, 1928, taking the southern route and traveling as far east as eastern Ohio, and returning the northern route, making a week's visit in Red Lodge, Mont., with Mr. Weaver's brother, J. R. Weaver.

Among some of the most interesting and notable places visited during this trip was the largest oak tree (named Hooker Oak) in the world, near Chico, Calif. From there they passed through lemon, orange and olive groves until they entered the state of Arizona, where they stood spellbound on the banks of the Grand Canyon. In looking into the canyon they could see pack trains of mules, carrying sightseers, which looked like tiny mice creeping up the hillside. After viewing the scenery of the canyon from the rim, they made their next interesting stop at the Indian village where the Apache Caves are located. These caves are owned by an Apache chief who was graduated from the U. of O. at Eugene. From these caves they passed through the Rio Grande country which brought them into Santa Fe, where they enjoyed a drink at the "Fountain of Youth," the oldest well in the United States. From here they crossed over the Raton Pass into the mining district of Colorado.

After traveling through Kansas and Nebraska, where they saw bumper crops, they crossed the Missouri River at Omaha and entered Iowa, where the tall, tall corn grows. Here Mr. Weaver was very much taken up with the country; he saw fat hogs galore. While in this state they visited the Keokuk dam, the largest water power dam in the world. It is one mile long.

On June 2 they arrived in Rochester, Minnesota, where they spent fifteen days at Mayo Bros. clinic. Mr. and Mrs. Weaver went through the clinic, the doctors finding Mr. Weaver to be in perfect health.

After leaving Rochester they visited relatives throughout Illinois and Ohio. At Carthage, Illinois, Mrs. Weaver visited her mother's sister, Mrs. Margaret Hamilton, who is 89 years "young." From Carthage they visited the old home of Abraham Lincoln at Springfield, and from there they stopped to view the Ohio Caverns. It was in this state that they had the pleasure of getting acquainted with some of their Weaver relations.

On July 3 they started for home (Oregon), leaving Sidney, Ohio, via Chicago and St. Paul, traveling west on the Yellowstone highway, and passing through the Bad Lands in North Dakota and coming into Custer Battlefield, Montana. From Montana they came into the Yellowstone Park, where they saw Old Faithful, the Grand Canyon of Yellowstone, Mammoth Hot Springs, and climbed Mt. Washburn, where they enjoyed the beauties of the park.

On leaving the park they traveled to Burns, Oregon, where Mr. and Mrs. Weaver enjoyed a visit with their son, John Weaver.

GERMAN TOURIST SHIP STRIKES ROCK OFF SPITZBERGEN

OSLO, July 26.—A wireless message picked up by stations on the coast of Norway today said that the German motorship Monte Cervantes was receiving assistance from the Russian ice breaker Krassin. The vessel was at Bell Island, Spitzbergen, and in no immediate danger.

The Krassin, which was about to go to Norway for repairs after having rescued seven survivors of the Italia, picked up SOS calls from the vessel yesterday and went to its aid.

The Monte Cervantes, with 1,500 passengers aboard, struck a rock. Water entered its hullworks. Work of pumping these out was underway today.

BERLIN, July 25.—The head of the Hamburg South American line in Hamburg today said that passengers aboard the motorship Monte Cervantes, which struck a rock in Bell Sound, Spitzbergen, were not in danger. The vessel is on a tour, which it will continue.

RADIO THIEVES' LAIR YIELDS GUNS AND EXPLOSIVES

QUEBEC, July 25.—The mystery of a powerful radio station which interfered with the reception of programs from licensed stations in the United States and Canada has been solved, but another mystery in connection with it today threatened international complications.

Investigators from the department of justice discovered the unlicensed radio station in a house in Silery, a Quebec suburb, and also a large quantity of dynamite and a stock of rifles. The radio station, they said, was capable of communicating with European capitals.

Auguste Nelma, 64, and his son, Arsene, 21, were arrested and charged with illegal possession of explosives. Arsene also was charged with the theft of radio equipment from the Canadian Marconi company. The two pleaded guilty and were held without bail pending a further investigation.

STEWART OUTWITS ROCKEFELLER BY BUYING UP STOCK

NEW YORK, July 25.—The New York World today says that Colonel Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, has checked the efforts of John D. Rockefeller Jr. to force him from the leadership of the \$500,000,000 corporation.

According to unimpeachable informants, says the World, Col. Stewart has cornered 51 per cent of the stock of the corporation which he now controls by ownership or proxy.

MAINTAIN LOBBY AT WASHINGTON IS ADVICE TO FARMER

BERKELEY, Calif., July 25.—Organized farming should set up its own agency in Washington, D. C., to lay its views before congress and other federal groups just as organized labor and organized capital do throughout the country, representatives of 1,000,000 agriculturists meeting at the university of California here told today.

This recommendation was made by Charles W. Helman, secretary of the national cooperative producers federation, in an address before the American Institute of Cooperation.

"Cooperative organizations in the United States have reached the point where they should set up a national agency to represent their common views before congress and the federal bodies of government," Mr. Helman said.



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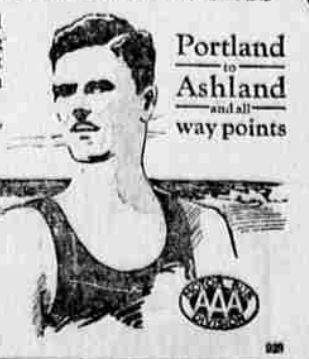
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
