DR. DICKEY AND WIFE TO RE-VISIT HEAD-HUNTER LAIR

NEW YORK, July 25.—A husband and wife who spent their honeymoon on an expedition into the head-hunter country of South America will sail August 1 to again penetrate the South American wilds to investigate the supposed custom of an Indian tribe of burying their sick alive.

Dr. Herbert Spencer Dickey, who has spent 25 years in the tropics, says the members of the tribe, known as the Piraroas, are exceedingly primitive and dark brown in color with features indicating a Mongolian origin.

"When a man takes sick, we are informed," he said, "that he is placed in a cave with a pot of water and a basket of food. If he gets well, he comes out. If he dies, he remains there."

Dr. Dickey said a search would be made for funeral urns of ancestors of the present-day Piraroas, or the tribe that once inhabited that region and which he believes to have been buried.

Dr. Dickey and his wife will be the only two white members of the expedition which is being sponsored by the museum of the American Indian Haye foundation. They were married in 1925.

VACCINE STOPS SERIOUS ILLS

The vaccine for hemorrhagic septicemia of sheep and cattle, which is prepared by the department of bacteriology, is reported to be 100 per cent efficient where the disease is properly diagnosed. Living cultures which are weakened are sent out from the department at request. Time is important in the injection of the vaccine which is not effective if used later than two weeks after the preparation is made.

In sections where the disease is bad it is recommended that stock be vaccinated each spring as a preventive measure. Two cubic centimeters is the average dose that is recommended but in case of cows where symptoms are showing a five cubic centimeter dose may be used, as shown on the graduated syringe used.

A new method of controlling body lice on chickens has proved effective in trials at the Oregon experiment station. Full strength liquid nicotine sulfate is applied with an oil can as a thin strip along the top of roosts just before evening. The strong gas kills both lice and nits during the night. This method was demonstrated at the recent convention of Oregon poultrymen and found cheaper and easier than the standard sodium fluoride method.

The western 12 spotted cucumber beetle which attacks such flowers as asters, chrysanthemums, dahlias and roses may be controlled by applications of lead arsenate spray or a nicotine sulfate dust, says the entomologist of the Oregon experiment station. Sprays are made up of 3 tablespoons of arsenate powder and 1 gallon of water, nicotine sulfate 3 pound, and hydrated lime 4 3/4 pounds are constituents of the nicotine dust.
