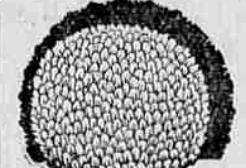

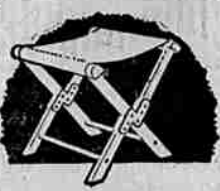

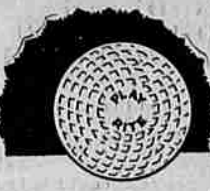

SAWMILL MAY BE STARTED IN ROSEBURG SOON

(Continued from page 1.)

adjoining the stream, so that he can reconstruct the old mill dam at that place and provide a suitable mill pond. Rights of way have been obtained for the extension of the North Roseburg spur to the property and all other arrangements made for improving the site. Mr. Stone has also secured options on several million feet of timber, all located within 10 or 12 miles of Roseburg, the timber supply being ample to keep the mill in operation for many years. Through his connections with lumber dealers he has tentatively arranged for the sale of the entire output of the plant just as soon as he can start operation.

Site Is Asked
His proposition is similar to the usual agreement in such industrial projects. He asks for the formation of a local company to purchase the property and construct the buildings and make the improvements, his machinery and equipment being turned over to the company to represent his portion of the investment.

It is proposed to form a local stock company having a capital stock of \$39,000. Of this amount \$25,000 would be placed on sale, the remainder being held as treasury stock to be sold when needed. Mr. Stone agrees to take \$15,000 worth of this stock through cash and machinery. This leaves only \$10,000 to be subscribed locally.

The stockholders will participate in all profits, will elect the officers and otherwise join in the business control of the corporation. The money raised by the sale of stock will be used to erect buildings and make all needed improvements. Mr. Stone will then move his machinery and equipment to this city and will establish his mill. He will place \$5,000 of his portion of the stock in escrow in a local bank to insure the installation of the machinery and its profitable operation for a period of at least one year. Failing to make a profit in his first year of operation, he agrees to forfeit the stock deposited to the benefit of the stockholders.

Investigation Made
Following the recent presentation of Mr. Stone's proposition, H. E. Cully, Chamber of Commerce secretary, and E. K. McLendon, who is handling the local end of the negotiations, went to Seattle to make a thorough investigation of the plant owned by Mr. Stone and to learn what they could of the opportunity for profitable operation in Roseburg.

They found the machinery and equipment to be as represented and fully sufficient to provide a daily output of 20,000 board feet of lumber in an 8-hour shift. The machinery is reported to be of modern type and in good condition. The only reason the mill is not operating, they report, is because of a lack of available timber in that district, the entire area having been logged off by past mill operations. Mr. Stone has complete logging equipment and mill machinery, all of which he proposes to bring to this city.

Saw Mills Profitable
They went into conference with several financial experts, including the president of one of the leading banks of Seattle, and found a very optimistic tone expressed by these men. The Seattle banker stated that during the past few years the lumber industry has been on the upgrade.

At the present time it is the small operator who is making the greatest profit. This is because his overhead is small, and he has a small timber tax to pay. The bigger mills with their greater operating costs and their large timber holdings, are unable to operate as profitably.

It was the opinion of these experts that a mill located in a place where timber could be procured so cheaply as in Douglas county could be operated in a very profitable manner.

It is declared the large companies are not involved in the proposed battle. The present retail price of gasoline in Portland is 21 1/2 cents a gallon.

NEW YORK, July 27.—Federal Judge William H. Atwell of Dallas, who is sitting here, noted a difference between New York and his home state. "Down in Texas," he remarked in court, "the statements of arresting officers are accepted as the truth, and this is the first time I have ever observed testimony of the police ignored. The remark was occasioned by the acquittal of a man accused of operating a still. In another case the judge imposed the maximum penalty, a fine of \$500, for possession of a quart of whiskey.

Markets

PORTLAND, July 27.—Cob corn was cheaper this morning, going to the trade at \$1.50 per sack for the yellow varieties and \$1.00 for the white.

Apples of good quality were going all the way from 50 to 84 cents this morning while Oregon Alexander peaches ranged from 35c to 75c per crate. California Elbertas were bringing around 90c for the best. Plums and pears were also in generous supply and cheap, especially stocks suitable for canning.

Potatoes continued to bring strong prices, with the bulk of supplies local and The Dallas stock going at \$2.75@3.00. A temporary shortage of new potatoes was noticeable this morning. Best new potatoes sold as high as \$1.75 per sack early. Old potatoes were unchanged.

Country dressed meat markets were exceedingly dull with trading almost at a standstill. Large accumulation of beef was reported with demand small. Best hogs were quoted 15@16c, best light veal at 21c, and lamb 20@22c.

Poultry quotations were steady and unchanged.

Butter and egg markets were both firm. The only quotable change in prices was on standard extra grade eggs, which advanced 1c to 28 1/2c per dozen.
