BOND EXCHANGE PROPOSED TO FIX OCHOCO MUDDLE

(Associated Press United Wire)

SALEM, Ore., July 27.—An exchange of \$800,000 in 4 per cent bonds, maturing over a period of 50 years, for approximately \$1,500,000 in outstanding bonds and matured interest coupons of the Ochoco irrigation district was orally offered the state reclamation commission yesterday by the committee representing the bondholders of the district.

This is the first definite refinancing plan affecting a distressed Oregon irrigation district to be presented to the commission under the provisions of an act of the 1927 legislature. The offer was based on the state's foregoing its claim entirely.

Lake M. Bechtel of Prineville, attorney for the district, and W. G. Ide of Portland, representing the land settlement committee of the state chamber of commerce, conferred with State Engineer Luper and the members of the commission.

The committee offered further as part of the plan to relieve the district of the general obligation burden now imposed on the settlers and to remit one year's interest.

It was said that if the offer were made effective the lands of the district would be subject to a yearly assessment for water charges alone of about \$5.50 an irrigable acre except where assessments were reduced by old water right credits.

The reclamation commission will not act on the offer until it has been presented in writing.
