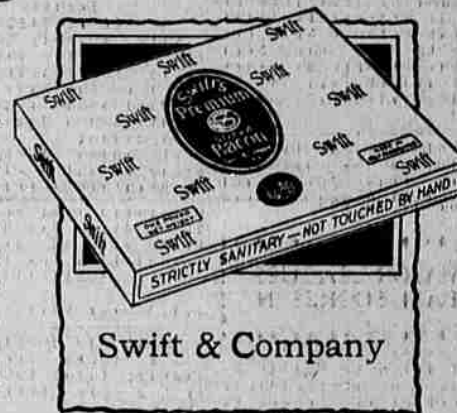

Vegetable and flowering plants may be protected from cutworm by application of poison baits, according to the entomologist at the Oregon experiment station. Baits in made up of Paris green or white arsenic 4 ounces, dry bran 5 pounds, molasses 1 pint and water 2 quarts. Dahlia, rose, geranium, carnations and asters are attacked and often ruined over night. Thorough cultivation is also a control measure.
