COMING TO ANTLERS

"We Americans," With George Sidney and Patsy Ruth Miller, Among Great Pictures.

"We Americans," one of the great motion pictures of the year, comes to the Antlers Tuesday.

It is an unusual picture in many ways. In the first place it brings George Sidney in a dramatic role. Sidney is too great an actor to stay always in the comedies which have brought him to so many screens.

He portrays his role in "We Americans" with rare discrimination; he never overacts, and proves himself capable of rare emotional

depth, including honest tears.

But a little about the story: Three families emigrate to New York, from Russia, Germany and Italy. The parents retain all they loved of the old country, making an effort to become Americanized, while the children grow up to be typical young Americans, incapable of understanding their parents, who, in turn, are incapable of understanding their children.

But the war comes along for a brief moment and their children enlist. To go further would spoil your enjoyment of this masterpiece but you can see the possibilities. The ending is of rare beauty and happiness, raising the picture to the heights of art.

That screen comedy can be no better than the newness and originality of its comedy situations, is one of the maxims of all motion picture directors.

If this is true, and the reaction of the great American audience has proved that it is, then Marion Davies' new starring vehicle, "The Patsy," which comes Sunday to the Antlers theatre, should establish a precedent as the 100 per cent comedy of the 1928 season, for no picture can provide so many startlingly comic situations.

The story is replete with natural comedy, directed by King Vidor with the same originality as he used

in handling the gum-chewing and tobacco-spitting episodes of his great epic, "The Big Parade." "The Patsy" opens with a comic introduction of Patricia Harrington, "The Patsy" of the Harrington family.

THE 'WHY' OF VOLUNTARY MOTHERHOOD

As Margaret Sanger, Birth Control Advocate, Sees It

Healthier mothers, better-cared-for children, and happier marriages are benefits that would accrue from a universal knowledge of birth control, according to Dr. Margaret Sanger.

"The idea of birth control coming to the poverty-stricken mother is the most important factor in her over-worked life. When her babies come too close together in the year of her young mother, she is not able to get her full strength."

"She cannot give them the proper care and attention her heart longs to give."

"If she has three years at least between the births of children, life will be different for her and her babies. She should be well and strong and normal psychologically—fully recovered from the strain of bearing one child before she has another."

"Finances also should be considered before the family is increased. There should be money enough in the bank to carry them all through any emergency that might occur."

"Increasing the family should be a voluntary thing because the children that arrive that way are wanted children for whom preparation has been made and for whom the family budget and family health provide."

CHICAGO, July 25.—Friday usually is payday for the pressmen on the Chicago Herald and Examiner, but due to a sortie of armed robbers last night, it was deferred until today.

Upon entering the office of the press room on the first floor, one of the three robbers tore open a pasteboard box, drew out a sawed-off shotgun and ordered David O'Shea and Martin Kelly, clerks, to lie down. A few minutes later Paymaster A. S. Van Collin, accompanied by Policeman George

Larson, entered with his payroll of \$6,870 in envelopes.

The sawed-off gun was pointed at them and as they raised their hands one of the trio disarmed the police officer, while a second seized the money.

The armed bandit guarded the employees while his companions fled. Witnesses told police two of the holdup men drove away in a dilapidated automobile and the third escaped on foot. Police were notified at once but no trace of the men was found.
