MEXICO BANS PLANNED CONVENTION OF LABOR

MEXICO CITY, July 27.—A convention made up of nation-wide representatives of labor groups, which had been called some time ago to convene today in Pachuca, has been ordered abandoned by the civil authorities of the state of Hidalgo.

The authorities feared that the convention would prove a menace to peace and order because of the charges of Agrarian and other Obregonista leaders that some of the labor elements of the republic were "psychologically responsible" for the assassination of General Alvaro Obregon.

PLANS MADE FOR HOOVER'S OREGON FISHING JAUNT

MEDFORD, July 27.—Herbert C. Hoover, republican nominee for president, and a party of fifty, on an auto tour and fishing trip through northern California and Southern Oregon, will arrive in this city Sunday evening. The time is indefinite.

Mr. Hoover, his manager, and two press representatives will be taken at once to the summer cabin of W. F. Isaacs on the Rogue river, where he will spend Sunday night. Monday morning the nominee will fish.

A telephone message announcing the coming of Mr. Hoover gave implicit instructions that politics were taboo and requested that no public reception be planned, as Mr. Hoover desired only seclusion and fishing.

The actual stay of the nominee in Medford will be only a few hours at the most. An effort will be made by the American Legion convention heads to induce him to remain over during the state convention here next week, but this is doubtful because of the amount of time required.

CHRYSLER-DODGE UNION NOT YET CONSUMED

Saenz May Take Obregon's Place

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, July 27.—After P. Chrysler, president of the Chrysler corporation, said today the entire plan under which his company has proposed to acquire Dodge brothers will fall unless there are substantial additional deposits by Dodge stock.

Final date for deposit ends tomorrow noon and total deposits today were understood to be about \$5,000, shares of preference and 77,500 shares of class A stock short of the minimum of 80 per cent of the total outstanding in each class, which Mr. Chrysler has said must be deposited before his corporation will proceed with the plan.

Mr. Chrysler's statement was subsequent to meeting of his directors which was explained as for the purpose of taking action with regard to certain formalities incidental to the progress of the plan.

Dodge stockholders meet tomorrow to consider the proposition.
