NOTED LUMBER BARON DIES IN HIS 88TH YEAR

plumber, lumberman whose name was linked with virtually every phase of public welfare in Minneapolis for 60 years.

Church and Labor Aided
He was a firm believer in religious training and subscribed heavily to church societies and charitable institutions. Mr. Walker once said he attributed his achievements to "my reputation for perfect integrity, fairness, and to my adequate treatment of every one, giving those I dealt with the benefit of doubt in every case where disagreement arose."

In proof of this he recalled he never had a strike of employees in any one of his concerns. One of his notable contributions to Minneapolis industrial life surrounded his donation of a site and finances for a building used as a clearing house between capital and labor during the early labor union days.

First Sold Grindstones
Mr. Walker was born February 1, 1840, at Zenia, Green county, Ohio, the son of Platt Bayless and Austin K. Walker. While attending Baldwin University at Berea, O., he began his business career by selling grindstones. His first definite step toward lumbering came at the age of 19 years when he bought timber lands at Paris, Ill., and sold them to the Terre Haute & St. Louis railroad.

He organized the Red River lumber company in 1882 and built large sawmills at Grand Forks and Crookston to cut from the vast pine stands. When timber showed signs of exhaustion in Minnesota he turned to other fields, buying California tracts until it was reported that he owned the largest single holding of timber in the United States.

Mr. Walker married Miss Harriett Bulet, daughter of the founder of Baldwin University, his alma mater, in 1863. After her death in 1877, he endowed several charitable institutions with which Mrs. Walker was actively identified during her life.

WARNING ISSUED ABOUT ACTIVITIES AUTOMOBILE CLUBS

Many Concerns Working
Lucrative Craft, Portland
Better Business Bureau Reports.

The Chamber of Commerce has received considerable inquiry concerning solicitors representing an automobile club endeavoring to secure memberships in this county. It is understood that several memberships were obtained upon representations made by the agents. The Chamber of Commerce, investigating this proposition and has received a letter from the Portland Better Business Bureau, supplementing telephone conversations of a few days ago.

The letter says:

"In response to your inquiry concerning the sale of memberships in various alleged automobile clubs, we regret to inform you that there are a number of unscrupulous firms and individuals operating throughout the west for the sole purpose of making easy money off of trusting motorists."

"The automobile club promotion field has been one of the most lucrative grafts that has been open to small time promoters. At the present time, there is only one active automobile club promotion operating in this state. This is the United States Automobile Service Club with headquarters in Portland."

"This club was organized something over two years ago by a bootlegger and a slicker from Detroit, Michigan. It has changed hands several times during its existence and while it is still operating, it is in a most precarious condition at the present time. We have had a number of reports in the last few days of worthless checks issued by the club."

"This club is selling memberships on a two-year basis for \$28. Out of this \$28, high powered salesmen, who have been imported from California, receive \$17 commission. After the ordinary overhead of the club is paid, they have very little money left with which to render any sort of service during the period of the contract."

"Salesmen for this club continually misrepresent its service, in many cases claiming that a membership entitles the member to complete insurance protection. As a matter of fact, the service rendered by this club has been very unsatisfactory to many people who have joined it, causing them to complain to this office."

"In addition to this auto club protection, salesmen for various other promotional clubs with high sounding names occasionally slip into the state and make a quick clean-up, leaving members with nothing but a worthless membership card."

"There is a law in this state, which was passed by the last legislature, making it necessary for any automobile club to put up a bond with the insurance commissioner and to satisfy that official as to their honesty and business integrity before they can operate. The United States Automobile Service Club, however, secured an injunction preventing the insurance commissioner from enforcing the act. It is quite possible that this injunction will be dissolved at any time and if the club is not then able to comply with the provisions of the act it must go out of business and members will of course lose their money. This same law applies to all other automobile clubs that attempt to operate here."

"No one can safely join one of these promotional clubs if it has not complied with that law."

"We are continually receiving reports from other sections of the country regarding automobile club promotions, where car owners are induced to buy memberships on the basis of certain discounts and insurance service and we have yet to hear of a single automobile club organized by promoters for private profit that has been successful."

"There are, of course, legitimate clubs operating in all sections of the country, such as the Oregon State Motor Association in this state, which holds the exclusive AAA franchise for Oregon. Such clubs are universally organized as cooperative enterprises and are not operated for the profit of a few promoters."

"If salesmen for so-called clubs are operating in your territory, we will appreciate your giving this letter to your newspapers so that prospective members may be put on their guard."

in response to calls for aid yesterday. Chief of Police McLeod said that there would be no lessening of police preparations until he knew that no parade could be held.

PORTLAND WOMAN VICTIM OF POISON NEEDLE WIELDER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—Police were investigating a "poison needle" mystery today. A young woman, whose name was withheld, reported that she had been the victim of an attack while she was asleep in her room in a downtown hotel.

She had left the Alder street hotel, where she is employed, early yesterday, went to her room, locked the door and retired. At noon yesterday she awoke to find her room in disorder. There were several bruises on her body and a needle prick on her arm.

A physician who examined her said she evidently had been given a strong opiate with a hypodermic syringe. Police said it was possible for the young woman's room to be entered through an open window, but that none of the tenants of the hotel had seen any suspicious character.

IOWA DEMOCRATS ENDORSE SMITH'S VIEWS ON LIQUOR

Nominee Heralded as Hope
of People of Common
Class; Curtis to
Invade East.

DES MOINES, July 28.—Gov. Alfred E. Smith's position on the prohibition question, including his views on "the chaotic conditions resulting from lax enforcement of the prohibition laws" has the endorsement of Iowa Democrats.

The state Democratic convention, in endorsing the Democratic presidential nominee's stand on the prohibition question yesterday, rejected a qualifying clause of "and from the floor, to stand by Smith's sentiments" and some more stringent methods of liquor enforcement were found.

The presidential nominee was lauded as the political hope of the common people, and the convention endorsed in its entirety the party platform upon which the national campaign will be built.

NEW YORK, July 28.—Governor Smith and several members of his family set out in automobiles at noon today for Hampton Bays, Long Island, where the Democratic candidate will put aside thoughts of politics over the week-end and will indulge in surf bathing.

The governor arrived from Albany last night and held political conferences with Governor Ritchie of Maryland and other Democratic leaders.

Curtis to Stamp East
NEW YORK, July 28.—The Republican vice-presidential nominee Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas will open his eastern campaign either in Syracuse or here.

In making this announcement today, B. S. Moss, a theatrical producer, and chairman of the Curtis for Vice-President club's advisory committee, said Curtis "desires to become better acquainted with the people of the east and also believes it is the strategically perfect point at which to begin the battle for election of the Republican ticket."

BELA KUN IS SENT OUT OF AUSTRIA

VIENNA, July 28.—Bela Kun, notorious communist who recently was arrested in Vienna on charges of entering the country on a false passport, was removed from prison last night and sent in a train to the German frontier under heavy guard.

His destination was believed to be Passau, where the German authorities will assume charge of him. It is thought likely he will be placed aboard a German steamer at Stettin and then will be conveyed to Leningrad.

The Hungarian government has tried to get hold of Kun to hold him for trial on charges growing out of the fall of the Karolyi government by the Austrians declined to hand him over.

LOCAL PEOPLE ESCAPE WHEN CAR GOES OVER GRADE

With only a tree on a steep embankment to hold the machine from nearly a 30 foot drop into the river, Dr. A. C. Seely, specialist of this city, and Mrs. Tom Wharton, office nurse, who were enroute to this city after conducting a clinic with the members of the county health unit at Reedsport, narrowly escaped serious injury and possible death yesterday afternoon at about 5:30 o'clock.

The accident occurred about 4 1/2 miles west of Elkton on a very narrow road. E. Derflinger of Eugene was driving to the coast and both drivers drew their machines over to the edge of the road as far as possible to keep from scraping fenders. Just as Dr. Seely's car had safely passed and was going down a steep incline, the machine went over the soft shoulder of the road slowly, settling against the tree about six feet down from the road. Only for the fact that the car was traveling very slowly, it would have missed the tree, its only protection, and gone into the creek. Mr. Derflinger stopped to render assistance to the Roseburg people, who came into the city. The machine is being brought in today.
