DRY WHEAT BELT OF KANSAS SWEPT BY COSTLY FLOOD

HAYS, Kansas, July 30.—Flood conditions prevailed in the comparatively dry wheat belt of western Central Kansas today following near cloudbursts in several sections yesterday.

Although 300 families were forced to flee homes after darkness last night when the swiftly rising waters inundated the low southern residence section, no loss of life was reported here.

Property damage was estimated at several hundred thousand dollars.

Water was six feet deep in the buildings of Kansas State Teachers college and also had entered the Union Pacific station. Only the second story of many houses was above the flood. About a third of the town was under water.

A fence of any kind in Hays made necessary hastily improvised rafts, while women and children were carried from their homes on men's backs.

Railroad tracks washed out in several places and it was reported the Union Pacific bridge over Big Creek, a half mile west of here, was doomed.

The most fashionable homes were located in the section inundated. Residents of Holington were forced to higher ground when waters swept into the lower part of town. A mile of railroad track washed out.

About 100 families were driven from home near Ellis when Big Creek overflowed, washing out a mile of Union Pacific tracks.

From three to ten feet of water raged through the streets there. Thousands of bushels of wheat in elevators were soaked while shocked wheat nearby was ruined.

REEDSPORT MAN 'CHARGED' THREATS TO KILL HIS WIFE

Earl Oden, of Reedspoor, was brought to Roseburg Saturday night by Deputy Sheriff J. L. Dodson, charged with making threats to kill, and is being held for grand jury investigation. Oden was arrested several weeks ago on charges of possession of moonshine and was given a 60 day term in the county jail. He was released July 17 and returned to his home at Reedspoor, where it is claimed that he immediately began to make trouble for his divorced wife, threatening to kill her, until finally she swore out a complaint against him. He was arraigned in front of Justice of the Peace Benson and was bound over to the grand jury, bail being fixed in the sum of \$250.

Officer Dodson also reported the arrest of Thomas Gallagher, a resident of the Smith River district, who is charged with assault and battery. Gallagher was also bound over to the grand jury, but furnished bail in the sum of \$100 so was not brought to this city. It is claimed that Gallagher was in altercation with Douglas Dalley, the latter receiving severe injuries in the encounter.

CAMPER IS FINED \$10 FOR LEAVING CAMPFIRE BURNING

E. M. Hess, a resident of Chilquin, was fined \$10 today by G. Debernard, justice of the peace for the upper Umpqua district. Hess was arrested at Big Camas yesterday charged with leaving a camp fire burning. He had been camping near Fish Creek bridge in the Diamond Lake district and upon breaking camp failed to extinguish his fire. A forest service employee found the camp fire burning and telephoned ahead to Big Camas where the man was arrested. Hess entered a plea of guilty over the telephone and paid the fine imposed upon him.

FARMER AND FREE LANCE PULPITEER MURDER SUSPECTS

DAHLONE, Ga., July 30.—An unordained preacher and a farmer were in jail today awaiting arraignment Tuesday on charges of murder growing out of the recent discovery of the skeleton of Joe Walden, 18-year-old farm boy who disappeared more than a year ago.

The dismembered skeleton was found on the farm of Abe Smith, one of the prisoners, last week, and Smith was held on a technical charge of suspicion until a coroner's jury Sunday held a murder charge should be preferred. Henry Turner, the preacher, engaged in a fist fight with the youth several weeks before he disappeared. Turner was arrested Sunday on a murder charge.

Smith denied knowledge of the boy's death. Turner refused to make a statement. Authorities declared their belief that the youth was slain in a quarrel involving liquor basing their theory on the contention that the region where the body was found has been "infested with stills."

HOOVER ON ROGUE RIVER TO ANGLE FOR STEELHEADS

BIG CREEK LODGE, near Medford, Ore., July 30.—Herbert Hoover came today to the first of the two fishing grounds he has selected in this neighborhood for his first go at his favorite sport since his return west after his nomination as the republican presidential candidate.

Steelheaded trout in the Rogue river, fish that have been down to the sea and back, were sought by Hoover before he essayed a return later in the day back to northern California in an effort to lure the mountain trout at the headwaters of the Klamath river at Brown's camp near Hornbrook.

The commerce secretary was an overnight guest here of William Isaacs, a Medford merchant, who met the automobile caravan at Grants Pass, held a hurried conference with the Oregon policemen who were showing the party the way over the mountain roads and then became pilot himself.

At Brown's camp on the upper Klamath where the secretary is to go later today Mr. Hoover will be the guest of Milton Eberg of San Francisco for part of today, tomorrow and most of Wednesday, leaving late the third day for Davis where he and his companions will board train for Palo Alto.
