USE OF ARTIFICIAL COLOR IN COTTAGE CHEESE NOT PERMITTED

Adding artificial color to cottage cheese conceals inferiority and such use of color is unlawful in products subject to the Federal Food and Drug Act, according to a recent ruling by the Food and Drug Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture, which is charged with the enforcement of that act.
The food and drug act prohibits the use of artificial color when such color conceals inferiority. Cottage cheese formerly was a skin milk product altogether. It is now made extensively both with and without cream. When artificial color is added to either of these products it creates the impression that all the color of the product is due entirely to cream. This deceives and misleads the purchaser by concealing the inferiority of the product.
Colored cottage cheese coming within the jurisdiction of the food and drug act is subject to seizure and the concern responsible for violating the law subject to prosecution.

MORE FARMERS NOW PARTICIPATE IN COOPERATIVE ENTERPRISES

A larger number of farmers than ever before are participating in cooperative marketing and purchasing, according to a recent survey by the Department of Agriculture. Some of the farmers are participating as members of particular associations, some as shareholders, some because of being under contract to market cooperatively, and some as shippers, consignors or patrons, using the facilities furnished by the various cooperative enterprises.

Including duplications because of farmers belonging to two, three, four or five associations, the estimated membership is 3,000,000, divided among the more important of the commodity groups as follows: Grain marketing associations, 500,000 participants; associations marketing dairy products, 500,000; associations marketing livestock, 450,000; associations marketing fruits and vegetables, 215,000; cotton marketing associations, 140,000.
Approximately 70 per cent of the total membership is in the 12 North Central states, compared with 52 per cent in 1925, and 55 per cent in 1915. Less than 12 per cent of the membership is now in the Southern states, compared with 30 per cent in 1925, and 15 per cent in 1915. The Pacific Coast states are of about the same relative importance, in regard to membership, as in 1925.

HENRY FORD, 65, SAYS HE HASN'T FOUND AGE LIMIT

Motor King Asserts World Helpless if Deprived of Guidance of Men Over 50.

DETROIT, July 30.—Henry Ford expects to do more in the next five years than he has in the last twenty, he told visitors who came today to congratulate him upon his 65th birthday anniversary. Ford was in an optimistic mood and made it clear he had not yet found his "age limit."

He believes the judgment and experience of men over 50 are essential. "You take all the experience and judgment of men over 50 out of the world and there wouldn't be enough left to run it," he said. "Youngsters have their place and are necessary but the experience and judgment of men over 50 are what give purpose and meaning to younger men's efforts."

Ford spent the day as he spends most days—in making the rounds of his plants in the Detroit area and otherwise concerning himself in the activities of his interests here. Some one asked him how much money he had lost in making the change from the Model T to the model A car.

"Who said I had lost anything?" he countered. "We can't lose what doesn't belong to us," he said. "The profits we made on 15,000,000 Model T cars wasn't our money. The public paid it to us. The money profits came from the people and we look upon them simply as a public trust which must be put back into the manufacture of something that will help men and women to better and more productive lives."

NEW AIR MAIL RATES EFFECTIVE STARTING AUG. 1

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Increased postage of air mail expected to result from the new 5-cent rate, effective August 1st, will require the addition of a new mail plane on the San Francisco and Oakland to Chicago route, W. G. Herron, vice-president, in charge of traffic for Boeing Air Transport, Inc., announced here today.

A series of special mail planes, powered with Pratt and Whitney "Hornet" motors and designed to cruise at 115 miles per hour, are now under construction at the Boeing Airplane Company's plant in Seattle. New Boeing-built air mail, express and passenger planes were recently placed on the Pacific Air Transport route. A total of 30 Boeing planes, each with a capacity of 1600 pounds, are now operating on the two lines.

A nickel for postage on air mail letters weighing one ounce or less, only three cents more than ordinary postage, will be within reach of practically all business and social correspondents, Mr. Herron believes, and it is expected that the volume of mail will increase rapidly.

Ten cents postage for each additional ounce after the first ounce will be required, but few letters reach the one-ounce limit. It is contended, however, that the statement says, equals four pages of average weight business paper with the envelope. Four pages will carry about 2,000 words of single spaced typing.

The reduced rate is the only change in the air mail regulations, which became effective more than a year ago. Five cent air mail stamps will be issued but their use is not compulsory; any postage may be used. Air mail envelopes are recommended by the Post Office department, but ordinary envelopes may be used if plainly marked "Air mail." Air mail will continue to be collected from all boxes and letter chutes.

OFFICIAL SURVEY FOR BOULDER DAM OPENS AT CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, July 30.—A survey to determine the feasibility of constructing a dam in the Colorado river by the government got under way today at the interior department in response to a request by congress for such an examination.

three engineers and two geologists. They planned to visit two proposed sites for the dam and to survey estimates of cost.

Dr. Hubert Work, former interior secretary, who appointed the special Boulder dam committee was in Washington to greet the others along with Secretary West. Dr. Elwood Mead, director of the bureau of reclamation, said he expected the board to hold sessions here before going to Denver to study a mass of material gathered on the Colorado river and the proposed dam.

The board will report before the convening of congress.

BALL SCORES IN MAJOR LEAGUES

The Yankees dropped their third straight game to the Indians at Cleveland yesterday, 4 to 2, when Miller outpitched George Pipgras. It marked the longest Yankee losing streak of the year and Pipgras' second defeat in as many days.

Babe Ruth saved the champions from a shutout when he poked out his 41st homer of the year with Combs on base in the sixth inning. The blow put him 24 games, 28 days and seven homers ahead of his 1927 pace.

The complete collapse of the champions' pitching staff in the last week or so has cut what was an eleven game lead over Connie Mack's overhauling Philadelphia Athletics to five and a half.

Since July 22 the Yankees have won three games and lost eight. Over the same period the "A's" have won seven and lost one, a net gain in nine days of five and one-half games.

Meanwhile at St. Louis the Athletics were trimming the Browns, 5 to 4, and registering their seventh straight victory.

Alphonse Thomas was the whole show as the Chicago White Sox downed the Washington Senators, 6 to 0. Tommy held the Senators to seven scattered hits.

The Boston Red Sox fell deeper into the cellar when the Detroit Tigers gave them another drubbing, 2 to 1, in a tight pitchers' battle between Ken Holloway and Ed Morris. Harry Rice's homer in the ninth settled the battle.
