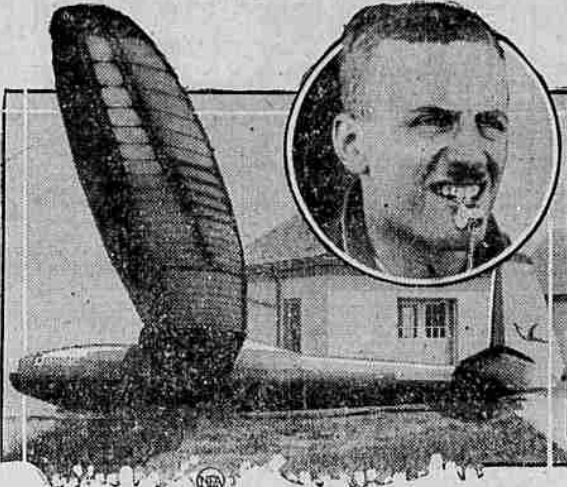

WILLIAMS COLLEGE PRESIDENT URGES DRY LAW RESPECT

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 2.—Respect for the prohibition laws while they are on the statute books, fair play for the farmers and international cooperation, were listed here today by Harry Garfield, president of Williams College and chairman of the Institute of Politics, as issues upon which the voters of the country were entitled to opinions from candidates for office.

Dr. Garfield was making the convention address at the opening of the eighth annual session of the Institute of Politics at Williams town.

"Certain questions have come up," Garfield said, "like Banquet's ghost they will not down. They cannot be put aside by sophistries of prejudice nor the appeals of politicians. The people of the country demand an answer."

"Voters of the United States have come of age and are thinking for themselves to the consternation of those who have heretofore assumed dictatorship of political action."

"It is true, as political leaders hasten to say, that prohibition is not a political question, but respect for law is," Dr. Garfield said. "Prohibition is primarily a moral and social problem. Until enacted into law it presents a personal problem only."

LIQUOR CLUBS OF GOTHAM ARE NEATLY FOOLED

Evidence Obtained by Dry Agents Posing as Big Business Men.

LAVISH WITH MONEY

Reputation Established as Liberal Spenders Opens Doors of Exclusive Booze Lairs.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—The inside story of how undercover prohibition agents hoodwinked Broadway today was made public in affidavits on file in federal court.

The reports of the agents revealed the easy manner in which the supposedly sophisticated hostesses, owners and head waiters of the city's foremost night clubs accepted them as "big business men" and sold them liquor for which 138 persons from 26 clubs have been indicted.

Helen Morgan, Broadway actress and one of the street's most popular hostesses, the affidavits said, appeared as sure that two of the agents were what they said they were—big business men from Dallas—that she offered to help one set up a night club in Dallas.

Texas Guinan, another affidavit said, invited the supposedly "big business men" to a party she was giving for a moving picture actress and also suggested that they visit the night club of her brother Tom.

Albert O. K. Wins was at the Frivoli club, the affidavits showed, that the agents gained the prestige that won them welcome to the other clubs. The headwaiter "Albert," impressed by a liberal spending of money, presented them with a card to Helen Morgan's "summer home."

They had made visits there before, they said, but had been unable to buy liquor. But with the card from "Albert" they purchased champagne at \$25 a quart, rye and Scotch whiskey at \$10 a pint and brandy at \$15 a pint.

Other visits followed to Tex Guinan's Salon Royale, the Furcans club, the Silver Slipper and the Ferndale club.

At all of these places, the affidavits assert, the agents, some of whom were accompanied by their wives, were served liquors in full view of and with the knowledge of the headwaiters and hostesses.

Only Spenders Wanted. In one of their trips to Helen Morgan's club, they were introduced to Miss Morgan, who joined them at her table and ordered brandy. When they complimented her on the quality of the drink, she responded: "It costs us \$6.25 a quart wholesale."

Miss Morgan, according to the affidavit, told them her club did not handle gin "because all the college boys drink gin. We have a lot of them here. They generally have only about \$20 to spend in an evening and bring their own gin. They could not afford to pay our prices."

Miss Morgan is quoted as saying that after the raid on her club last winter she made an arrangement with "Campbell, whereby he doesn't bother us." She evidently referred to Prohibition Administrator Maurice Campbell, the agent added.

Miss Guinan, who has contended she merely is a hostess and has nothing to do with the ownership of her club, was represented in one of the affidavits as sharing in the profits.

High Prices, Poor Stuff

An itemized account of one of the agents says: June 13—At Helen Morgan's one pint whiskey, two bottles of ginger ale, one quart of champagne, supper, \$52.75.

June 19—At Helen Morgan's: Drinks and supper, \$36.60.

June 2—At Silver Slipper club: cover charge, dinner and ginger ale, \$17.80. Two quarts champagne, \$50.

The champagne the agents purchased, federal officials said, was found on analysis to be only charged white grape juice spiked with alcohol. The rye and Scotch whiskeys were synthetic stocks of poor quality.

Motorist Fined—

Walter Frederickson, arrested the first of the week charged with operating a car on the wrong side of the road, following a collision with a car belonging to a Yoncalla resident, entered a plea of guilty in the Justice court yesterday and paid a fine of \$25. His license was revoked for a period of one month.

Airplanes Seen—

Roseburg had an opportunity today to see a number of the airplanes that are participating in the Medford air-circus as a part of the American Legion convention tomorrow. The planes went over in several groups during the day.
