RULING BARS PORT COMMISSION FROM PUBLIC DOCK SALE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 3.—The right of the Port Commission to sell a public owned dock was denied in a decision today by Circuit Judge J. T. Brand of Marshfield. Brand decided for the plaintiffs in a suit brought by Dr. George E. Dix and A. H. and Fred Powers, large timber holders on the Sixes river in Curry county, against the port and port commissioners of Port Orford. The suit was brought to enjoin the sale of the only dock there to C. C. Inman, promoter, who plans development of Port Orford.

Virtually all citizens of the port district had petitioned for sale of the dock. Brand held that the present structure was in the only available site in the harbor, and that the Oregon law did not now permit staking away of all means of conducting the functions, for which the port district was established. Brand previously had held that the port commission holds dock property in a governmental capacity.
