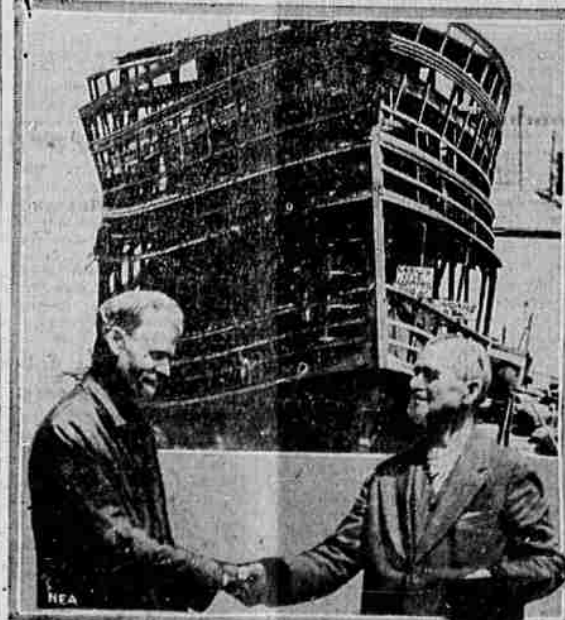

Western Noahs Build New Ark



There is a world-wide flood coming, according to some residents of Olympia, Wash. And above is the three-deck ark they have built for the occasion. Below are F. S. Young (left) and Capt. William Greenwood, who constructed the craft at the lower end of Puget Sound.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 2.—The political parties' platforms may indicate dryer times, but members of a local religious sect insist that before the year is over there will be another flood, such as Noah's craft weathered.
F. S. Young heads the religiousists, and, as a prophet, declares he foretold the World war and the outcome of Col. Lindbergh's flight. He declares the globe will be inundated as a result of earthquakes, and that the whole Pacific coast region will sink into the ocean.
In readiness, the cult has built its ark. Capt. William Greenwood, an old-time deep-water skipper, has worked long to make the ark seaworthy. It is approximately 100 feet long, with a 25-foot beam, with two gas engines as motive power and quarters to carry useful animals—to be located just before the flood by Young, Greenwood and the several families who are to also make the ark ride.
