FANATIC SORRY HE SLEW OBREGON BUT READY FOR SQUAD

Religious Passion Impels Deed After Moment of Uncertainty From Kindly Smile.

(Associated Press Local Wire)

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 4.—Jose de Leon Toral is quoted by El Universal Grafico as expressing remorse over having assassinated President-Elect Obregon. The interviewer, however, found that the slayer remains indifferent to the possibility of dying before a firing squad to pay for his crime.

Toral was asked: "Now that you have learned Obregon intended settling the religious question and was a good man, are you sorry you killed him?"

With his eyes fixed on a corner of his cell, Toral replied slowly and thoughtfully: "Yes, I am remorseful for not having thought with necessary amplitude about the matter and also for not having learned before these facts about the general."

Previously in the interview Toral had repeated in effect what he had said before—that solely "religious passion" caused him to decide to kill Obregon because he considered him responsible for "religious persecution."

Toral said he whispered an "Ave Maria" commended his soul to God and with a prayer upon his lips pulled the trigger of the pistol. He was confident his act would further the "reign of Christ, the King, in Mexico."

When Victim Smiled Obregon's winning smile caused him to hesitate, Toral revealed.

As he showed Obregon the cartoon he had drawn and was reaching for his pistol, Obregon looked up at him and smiled fleetingly. It was the kindly friendly smile for which the president-elect was famous. Toral found the smile so charming that he felt a flash of uncertainty. Then he remembered he was doing what he considered God's work, prayed and fired.

Yes, he loved his wife and children, his father and mother, Toral said. He reflected fully on the consequences to them of his killing Obregon. But his religious passion was stronger than love for any relatives, stronger than anything in life, therefore he continued steadfast in his determination to kill Obregon.

"I fired," said Toral. "Afterward I remembered and have thought much of that smile upon General Obregon's face when he looked at me."

PACIFISTS, CIVIC DUTY DODGERS ARE SCORED BY VETS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

MEDFORD, Aug. 4.—Sixty-seven American Legion posts of Oregon were awarded citations by the national department for membership gains, and Stuyton post was awarded a special citation for a 400 per cent increase in membership by national headquarters. This was announced at the Legion convention here today.

The Sam Jackson memorial for the outstanding achievement of the year in post activity was awarded to the Medford post, for the establishment and maintenance of a children's playground.

A resolution was adopted, subject to future action of the advisory committee, making the Pacific Legion a twice a month publication issued in newspaper form and changing the name of the publication to the "Oregon Legionnaire."

Carl L. Abrams, a delegate to the first Legion caucus in Paris in a short address, called upon the Legionnaires of Oregon to be "on guard against a well-organized Pacifist movement now under way" and he held that preparedness was the best guarantee of peace. Abrams condemned the movement as traitorous, and declared, "I for one would like to put them all on a ship and send them home."

Allen Rynon of Portland, chairman of the Americanization committee, presented a resolution which was adopted condemning the growing tendency of citizens to be slackers to their duty as jurors and voters and called upon Legion posts to organize to correct this evil and to establish community centers for the education of aliens seeking naturalization papers.

He declared that one Catholic priest and one nun were involved in the crime did not mean that the clergy as a body was responsible. The statement asserted that it was publicly known that the Mother Superior Concepcion Acebedo de la Lata was mentally deranged and that several cases of insanity have been reported in her family. The mother superior was named by Jose de Leon Toral, the slayer, as having indirectly influenced him.
