CURRY RESIDENTS PROTEST PLAN TO KILL GIANT ELK

GOLD BEACH, Ore., Aug. 6.—Curry county residents are in arms against the reported intention of the state game commission to kill the large bull leader of the Hunter's Head band of elk. It is held that the bull has outlived its usefulness as a sire and is now driving away young bulls, thus preventing increase of the herd.

Hunters claim that nature takes care of the situation adequately and that when an old bull becomes useless as a sire there is always a young male to depose the old ruler. Petitions bearing signatures of nearly every resident have been forwarded to the game commission, protesting killing of the old king of the herd.

The Hunter's Head elk herd is one of the leading attractions on the lower Roosevelt highway. The big eight-point bull leader is frequently seen.

WINNIEG ROBBERY TRIAL LEADS INTO MONTANA

FUTTE, Mont., Aug. 3.—Police and federal officers continued their search today for five bandits who are believed to have come to Butte after robbing a bank of \$60,000 at Winniege, Canada, last Monday. The officers reported that the bandits crossed into the United States with a car equipped with machine guns and shot up a federal car at Malda, N. Dak., then escaped into Montana.

ALBANIA MAY BECOME MONARCHY ONCE MORE

(Associated Press London Wire) LONDON, Aug. 6.—Albania, which emerged as a republic after a period of anarchy following the short reign of Prince William of Wied, may soon become a monarchy again.

Authoritative sources in Tirana state that parliament has dissolved itself to make place for a constituent assembly, adding that this will meet on August 25 to revise the constitution and a monarchy will be proclaimed, with President Ahmed Bey Zogu as king.

After the present constitution was framed in 1925 with Ahmed Zogu as president he was reported to have tried to win the consent of Yugoslav and Italian diplomats for the conversion of Albania into a monarchy. The Yugoslavs refused, but the Italians consented in principle.

BOY SCOUTS ARE HAVING GREAT TIME ON TRIP

Real Education Gained by Outing in Three Sisters Area.

GLACIERS ARE VISITED

Middle Sister Scaled by Entire Group Last Week—Will Be Home Last of Week.

The Boy Scouts of Douglas and Coos county, who are attending the Three Sisters camp are having unusually good fortune and are experiencing a wonderful trip, according to E. A. Britton, Scout executive, who is directing the trip.

In a letter received from Mr. Britton, he outlined the activities of the Scouts from the time they left Roseburg on the 27th of July.

"Last Saturday" (July 27) he says, "we reached Blue river at noon. Mrs. Sparks of Sparks Ranch had a splendid bear feed all ready for us. After putting the beans away we in an easy manner drove up the McKenzie five miles and then hiked two miles to the Eugene Scout camp. We had a good swim with them and then went on to McKenzie bridge where we stopped for a fire permit. When we reached Lost Creek Ranch the boys were given half an hour to look around. We went from there six miles further on to the beginning of the Linton creek trail where we found a splendid camp site with no mosquitoes present. We were on White Branch, a glacial stream running from Collier Glacier.

"On Sunday we went into the Proxy creek country, where we saw the Proxy Falls which make a drop of 250 feet. We followed the trail for about seven miles then cut through the timber toward Husband mountain, which we reached at about 3 p. m. We had a swim in Husband lake then followed Linton creek to Linton lake. We saw six more falls of over 200 feet on the way down. This hike covered a distance of 18 miles.

"On Monday we took a short hike down White Branch through rough country. Monday evening we moved camp up to Frog Camp. Tuesday morning we left camp, at 5:10 a. m., to climb the middle Sister. We took a lot of time and enjoyed ourselves on the way up. We reached the top of the mountain at 1:30 p. m. It was cloudy and cold so we only stayed the night to register. Some of the 'superstitious' boys were worried, as this was my 13th trip up that mountain.

"On Wednesday we rested and went to Scott Lake for a swim. Thursday we hiked up to Collier Glacier where we were all roped together so that we could travel the glacier in safety. The glacier was very interesting as was Cinder Cone, Ahlampla cinder field, and Yappa crater which we circled and struck for Scott trail which is east of the mountains. We reached camp early and made ready to move camp Friday morning. Friday we moved camp to this point (Devil's Garden Camp) which is a wonderful site. We are near Sparks and Devil's lake. Tomorrow (Saturday) we will go to the Devil's lake for a swim. The boys have washing to do and will turn washers for a day.

"Sunday will be spent in camp. Monday we will climb the South Sister if the weather is clear. One day will be spent at Broken Top mountain sliding on the snow. Before we realize it our time here will be up and we will be on the way home. The boys are getting a better trip this year than I have so far been able to give anyone. They are getting a far better trip than a group of adults who are paying \$50 each for one week. Besides the good time, they are receiving an education that will be valuable to them the rest of their lives. Each fellow is looking for himself and doing for himself in general. During the rain Thursday night they proved themselves capable campers.

23,000 ACRES OF COOS TIMBER SOLD

(Associated Press London Wire) MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 6.—The purchase of 23,000 acres of timber land, including 200,000,000 feet of Port Orford white cedar, and 200,000,000 feet of fir by R. E. Dant, Portland, and A. E. Adams, former president of Western White Cedar company of Marshfield, was announced here today.

It was largest timber deal made here in recent years. The Coos Bay Lumber company will continue to operate in the tract for about a year until timber available at camp five and seven is exhausted, and will then move into Ellen Ridge country, also near Powers.

An independent logging company may be formed to log the big tract, which lies in the Salmon creek and Sixes river regions.

French Flyers Bound for America

Bent on conquering the Atlantic in an east-west flight, the French airmen and their seaplane pictured above took off from the harbor of Brest, France, to fly to Bermuda or New York by way of the Azores. They landed successfully at Horta and awaited favorable weather for the ocean hop. Their attempt is backed by the French government. Their ship, La Fragate, is powered with two 400 horsepower motors, mounted in tandem.
