but if properly handled is entirely safe. Statistics regarding infant mortality, he states, show that as pasteurization increases the infant mortality rate decreases. This has been amply proven, he says, in the larger cities, where the milk supply has been systematically controlled and cleaned up. Seattle, he says, where there is more than 80 per cent pasteurization of milk supply, has the lowest infant mortality rate in the country.

Pasteurization, however, is not alone sufficient. It is necessary that a bacterial count be made at frequent intervals to keep a check on the milk supply. Milk containing over 50,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter is unfit for use. Dr. Stricker says, Portland requires milk to have less than 20,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter, but this is low. There are several ways in which milk can be kept with this low bacterial count. Dr. Stricker says, but the most economical system is through pasteurization.

Europe Spurns Raw Milk Raw milk in Europe is unknown, Dr. Stricker says. People there look upon raw milk the same as people in this country regard raw meat or other uncooked food. Raw milk, he says, is dangerous, unless kept extremely clean. The states of the Pacific slope are fortunate in that the climatical conditions are not favorable to the spread of milk borne diseases, but it is possible for very severe epidemics to result.

He suggested to the council that action be taken to adopt a program for cleaning up the local milk supply. Roseburg has always ranked high in the cleanliness of milk offered by various dairies, but there are always a few places, usually small dairies, that fail to meet the requirements. He suggested that the council call a meeting of all of the leading dairymen supplying milk to Roseburg and that an attempt be made to work out some suitable plan satisfactory to all.

It is to the interests of the dairymen, he said, to cooperate in this proposition, as it has been proven that where the milk supply is safeguarded that consumption of milk increases immediately. He said, because of the fact that a little epidemic may completely wipe out their business, resulting in the total loss of their investment. While damage suits may cause financial havoc, it is, therefore, to the dairymen's interest to help in providing a clean milk supply.

Pasteurization Economical Pasteurization, he said, costs very little, and when properly done does not affect the food value of the milk in the least. The milk is heated to a temperature of 112 to 115 degrees and is kept at that heat for 30 minutes. When this is properly done all disease germs are killed, but the food value of the milk is absolutely unchanged. There is no change of the cream content, and the taste is not affected. However, if the milk is heated beyond that point there may be some effect on the taste and cream content.

An ordinance requiring pasteurization, he said, would probably meet with favor from the larger dairymen, but would be objected to by the smaller dairymen, as a dairy must have an output of about 50 gallons of milk daily to be able to handle pasteurization properly. In the towns and cities where such ordinances are in operation, however, it has been found that the small dairymen could meet the requirements either by having a cooperative pasteurization plant, or by paying a small fee for having their milk pasteurized, the charge for the operation being quite low.

The state board of health has several model ordinances to meet the needs of the various cities of the state, and copies of these ordinances are to be submitted to the council for their consideration. It is expected that after a careful study has been made of the situation, a meeting will be called of the dairymen at which time the council will submit several proposals to determine which will work out most satisfactorily.

united fireman or be engaged in conveying a fireman to the scene of the fire.

Cars occupied by volunteer firemen are entitled to right of way over all other vehicles, and persons failing to give right of way to a fireman are subject to arrest and fine.

Enforcement Ordered Because of the general disregard of these traffic regulations the council last night ordered the police department to give special attention to violations in the future and to assist the fire department in enforcing the situation. All of the members of the fire department have special police power during the time of a fire and may make arrests for traffic violations. The council is also granting special police commissions to several persons who will serve during the time of a fire to arrest reckless motorists.

Recorder Sherry was instructed to see that violations are dealt with in a strict manner and was advised to see that fines commensurate with the offense be imposed and that no leniency be shown.

time to the matter of considering an ordinance for the control of the city milk supply. The completion of the improvements at the Deer Creek bridge was also a subject for much discussion.

Because of the condition of the approaches at each end of the bridge the council recommended that the road either be closed or paved immediately. Engineer Epstein estimated the cost of paving and building the sidewalks, as originally contemplated, at about \$5,000, but the council seemed to think that the street department could pave the approaches with asphalt for a considerably less sum, leaving the present board skeptical. This matter was left to the street committee for determination.

The matter of lighting the bridge is also one that is puzzling the council. When the bridge was built the heavy electric cable was imbedded in the concrete instead of being placed in conduits. The cable was then brought up through the concrete railings in the form of loops to which it was proposed to attach the lights. This would have been very satisfactory had the loops been given protection, but through negligence on the part of some person, responsibility having not been directly placed, the loops were left unprotected, and as a result boys and adults have thoughtlessly or maliciously bent these loops back and forth until the wire has been broken off even with the surface of the concrete. It is now either necessary to string new wires in some manner, or else dig into the concrete deep enough to permit splicing new sections onto the cable. The light fixtures are here and as soon as the wiring can be put in the bridge will be lighted.

Property Title Settled The council also ordered the settling of title to property purchased some time ago by Ralph L. Russell. In 1926 the council entered into an agreement to sell property in West View to Mr. Russell for the amount of the city liens. Mr. Russell fulfilled his part of the contract, but the city delayed settling title and allowed a portion of the taxes to become delinquent while title was being settled. Mr. Russell's contract called for a complete title, and as the back taxes acted as an incumbrance he asked that the city take up these outstanding certificates. The request was granted and the city recorder instructed to issue a warrant for \$165 to cover the amount due.

A report was made that there has been a great deal of complaint regarding fire hazards due to dry grass in several sections of the city. The marshal was ordered to instruct property owners to have the tall grass removed. Authority was given the recorder to purchase wood needed for the city hall during the winter months.
