W. S. HAMILTON TO MAKE CAMPAIGN FOR COUNTY JUDGESHIP

Walter S. Hamilton, nominated on the democratic ticket for the office of county judge, is starting an active campaign to secure his election at the November general election. Mr. Hamilton was not a candidate at the primary election, but his name was written in by a large number of democratic voters and he has accepted the nomination and plans actively to engage in the political contest during the next few months.

Mr. Hamilton has had a good deal of experience in public office, particularly in city affairs, having served two terms as councilman, after which he was appointed to serve out the unexpired term of B. J. Stewart, when the latter was elected county judge. He was later elected and served another full term as mayor, conducting a most successful and progressive administration.

He has been engaged in business in Roseburg for a great many years, and is well known throughout the county.

KELLOGG PEACE PACT TO BRING PRAYER OF THANKS
LONDON, Aug. 9.—The Archbishops of Canterbury and York today issued a statement advising the clergy of the parish Churches of England to offer prayers of thanksgiving on the occasion of the signing of the Kellogg anti-war pact in Paris on August 27.

"The occasion is a great one in the contemporary history of the world," the statement said, "in cases where it was not possible to offer prayers on Monday, the archbishops suggest it should be done on Sunday, the 26th."
