BRIDGE COAT IS SYMBOL OF ULTRA-FEMININE VOGUE

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Accessories really are the barometer of women's fashions. Just recall the strictly tailored kerchiefs, buttoned neckties, hat trimmings, shoe buckles and so on of two years ago and you will see how they really were the keynotes to the straight-line silhouette and the tailored informality of those days' modes.

Styles now, as everyone knows, have gone feminine. Therefore we find the most extravagantly lovely accessories that we have seen in years.

Feather fans and boas came in this summer. Colorful novelties of every sort fill in the niches in a woman's wardrobe. Necklaces, slipper ornaments, jabots, vestiges, scarves, purses, sashes, girdles, and dozens of other articles now flood the market with tempting extras for the fashionable woman of today.

Extras that "Belong"

Some novelties in the way of accessories are making their debut into society this winter. They are not, however, bizarre aliens to the fashionable world, but rather the charming offspring of families of apparel that have long since been accepted members in the best sense.

I show today several of this type of accessories. First, I mention the one that will probably

A great many dramas of the underworld have been flashed upon the screen but it has taken Clara Bow, queen of the flappers, to give the motion picture public the most stirring of all.

The star accomplishes this in "Ladies of the Mob," a thrilling story of gangsters and their loves, something which is rarely taken into consideration when the police reports are read.

It is an entirely different Clara Bow, who throws off the wiles of the flapper and plunges herself into a powerful portrayal of a terror-stricken wife of a gangster. It is by far the heaviest bit of acting Miss Bow has attempted since her work in "Wings" and she proves conclusively that she can handle drama as well as the lighter roles which have made her so popular.

The story, which was written by Ernest Booth, is a tale of a young couple of the underworld, the husband a crook and the wife attempting at all times to keep him straight. The climax produces a thrill when, caught and surrounded by the police, Miss Bow takes the most drastic methods imaginable to keep "her man" on the straight and narrow path.

While pearls seem likely to remain as popular as ever, there is a change in their form, for fashionable wear this winter. Necklaces grow longer, more numerous, usually semi-precious, combined with them for color individuality.

One long string of irregular pearls combined with cabochon synthetic emeralds, joined by rondels in rhinestone. The three kinds of jewels make a most effective necklace.

Pearls, in smaller size, in five or six strands, fastened with a cabochon emerald and rhinestone, are effective for a bracelet to go with the necklace. They avoid the "sets" idea in jewelry, which is no longer good, but match enough to be lovely together.
