WIND-DRIVEN FLAMES LEVEL 30 BUILDINGS

tarium, the county tuberculosis hospital, were said not to be in danger so long as the wind held in its present direction. A change in the wind last evening turned the course of the flames, which had been advancing on the sanitarium.

Although the wooded land extends close to the university buildings and the towns in the path of the fire, they are separated from it by a railroad track. More than 100 farmers of the vicinity and members of their families were fighting the flames.

California Woods Ablaze.—SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 11.—Aided by scores of recruits, armies of fire fighters today were battling blazes in several sections that threaten California's forests. The Big Basin redwood park is in dire danger from flames beyond Pescadero and extra men were on the fire line to prevent further spreading. After burning two days in Cazos canyon, the fire has spread in three directions. Only a single hill early today separated the blaze from Big Basin park.

Sparks Shower Town.—A donkey engine spark started a forest fire between West Branch and Butte creek, near Chico, which was out of control when additional fighters arrived this morning. Two hundred men are working on the fire line. Sparks were falling on the town of Butte Meadows, seven miles away, and every effort was made to keep homes from being fired.

Fifty extra men were fighting the flames that threatened big trees of Big Meadows and Merced Grove, 10 miles below Yosemite. The fire is less than five miles from the towering trees. Cabins of two logging camps were burned by the onrushing flames.

Sequoia Threatened.—A hundred extra men were rushed from Porterville to the Keweenaw river fire, where 10,000 acres of brush had burned and the Sequoia National forest was threatened. Nearly 400 men are battling the flames.

Two hundred acres of pine timber were wiped out in fire on Chowchilla creek and Miami mountain, close to the north fork in Madera county that had covered more than 2,000 acres. Fifty rangers had circled the worst of the blaze and hoped to get it under control today.

Fire May Prove Fatal.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 11.—Eight persons were burned or injured, one of whom may die, in an early morning fire following an explosion on the south side today.

Many were saved from windows and fire escapes by firemen but several burned and were injured. Joseph Pecori, 19, who leaped from a third story window, was the most seriously injured.
