ENGLISH RAILWAY MEN ACCEPT CUT IN WAGES

(Associated Press London Wire)
LONDON, Aug. 13.—A saving in huge costs to railways of England of about \$15,000,000 annually is estimated to be the result of the 25 per cent cut in salaries and wages which has been ratified by the unions. The clerks' association completed endorsements of the workers when it followed the example of the shuntmen, locomotive men and the big general union of other railroad employees in voting to accept the cut.

The reductions in pay were undertaken to afford relief to the companies which have been undergoing a period of severe financial depression. Other measures have been taken, including a government subsidy in return for reduced freight rates on coal.

PATTERSON IGNORES KICK OF "KANGAROOED" MAN

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 13.—After a very brief hearing today Governor Patterson authorized the extradition of Horace J. Peterson, who is wanted in Canyon county, Idaho, on a non-support charge. Peterson was taken into custody by Sheriff O. G. Lloyd of Canyon county. Peterson is the man who complained to the governor of being "manhandled" by other prisoners while he was an inmate of the Multnomah county jail, but this grievance was not aired at his hearing today. Prior to the hearing he gave the governor a typewritten statement of his complaint but the governor returned it to him and it was not mentioned during the proceedings.

BOY DIES AFTER DOUBLE WHIPPING

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Aug. 13.—County officials today were investigating the death of George Holtzer, Jr., a farmer boy of the Mica boy region, after he had been whipped by his father last night and again this morning.

The father reported the affair to the sheriff's office, and was not held.

Coroner H. B. Mooney, after an investigation, reported that the boy had been punished last night for stealing money from a neighbor and again this morning for cutting down some trees belonging to the same neighbor.

When his father returned later from the neighbor's house, carrying a small stick, the lad, evidently fearing another whipping, ran into the house and hid under the bed, where he died, apparently from convulsions.

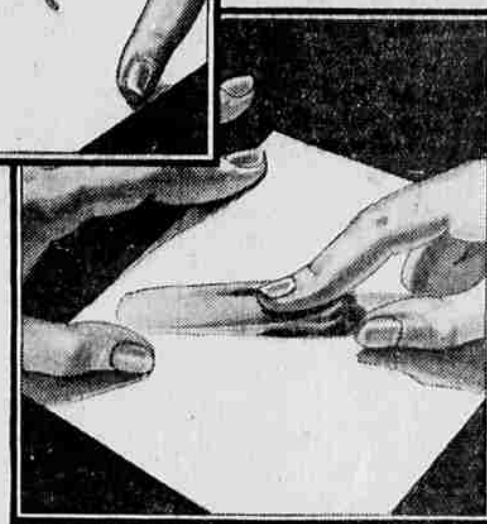

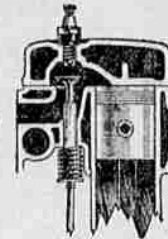

FARM REMINDERS
If every bit of leaves of gooseberry and currants affected with anthracnose or leaf spot could be completely destroyed, before the buds start in spring, the disease would be stopped. The Oregon experiment station finds, however, that it is not possible to do this.

Mash hoppers on the tree range are located near the houses so that the pullets will eat plenty of mash.

Watering in dry weather is essential to healthy plants and is best done early in the day so the plant will dry off before night making them less susceptible to disease. Lack of moisture stunts and weakens the plants often causing flower buds to dry up, drop off or develop into worthless small specimens.

Hens used for breeders are chosen from flocks that have laid one year and proved to be good layers. A vigorous fowl that is in good flesh is best.

CROOKED BANKRUPT GETS TERM IN FEDERAL PEN

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Louis Talack of Patterson, N. J., a silk textile manufacturer, was sentenced today to serve a year and a day in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta on a charge of conspiring to conceal assets in the bankruptcy of the Franklin silk mills.

The mills were petitioned into bankruptcy with debts amounting to \$250,000. Testimony showed that silk valued at approximately \$20,000 had been illegally concealed.
